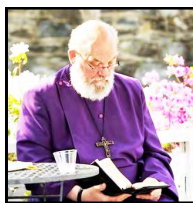

## Reflections From the Rector's Desk

After a few false starts, spring has finally arrived. The trees have begun to turn green with new leaves, the grass on our lawns has grown to the degree that it is now mow-able, plants and flowers are popping up above the ground and all of nature seems to be on the move. Recently I drove down with a companion to Bombay Hook, a national wildlife refuge and one of my favourite bird-watching places. Located on the Delaware Bay, Bombay Hook takes its name from a corruption of the Dutch "Boompjes Hoeck" meaning 'Little tree point', and was established in 1937 as a refuge and breeding ground for migratory birds. But the salt-water marsh is also home to its own resident wildlife: foxes, beavers, otters, as well as Bald Eagles and other birds that make their home there.

It was a perfect day. The sun was shining, and wild life in abundance were to be seen. The Bald Eagles are raising their young, and within minutes of arriving we had spotted the first of many that day (at one stage we spotted six in one group), and an Osprey catching fish.

Easter and spring, of course, are synonymous - seasons of new birth. The Jewish festival of Passover is derived from an ancient agricultural festival which was adopted by the Jews as a religious festival celebrating new life of a different kind through the Exodus. After the Crucifixion and Resurrection of Jesus, Passover became the Christian Exodus, Easter, when through his resurrection Jesus restored all of humanity to the Imago Dei in which we were created. Although the

Resurrection of Jesus occurred at a specific time and place in history, it is not a once and only event. You have often heard me refer to "resurrection moments", when bidden or not bidden Christ makes himself known to us. These are moments of new birth.

At one point in my visit to Bombay Hook I watched a Heron catch and swallow a large fish. Good news for the Heron, we might think, not such good news for the fish. Such is the paradox of nature and the seasons of life and death and new birth.

In not many weeks from now we shall celebrate the Feast of Pentecost - the season of the spirit. As the Resurrection promises new life, so the coming of the Holy Spirit assures us that God in Christ is always present, empowering us and accompanying us on life's journey. The Hebrew word for Spirit is ruach - breath. In the Genesis story, God's breath breathed over

## Feed My Starving Children

18 folks from St. Edward's participated in the Feed My Starving Children mobile pack event in early April. We spent 2 hours packing meals called Manna packs - rice, soy, dehydrated vegetables and vitamins/ nutrients - for hungry children throughout the world. Approximately 150-200 people pack during a shift. During our 2 hour shift, 143 boxes were packed, This equals 30,886 meals - this will feed 84 children one meal daily for one year! The total for the 3 day event packed 311,040 meals - this will feed 852 children one meal daily for one year. Over the past 5 years, this mobile pack event has packed more than 1,000,000 meals!!

We always enjoy this event and will be looking forward to next year. Thanks to all who helped.

Feeding the hungry lay at the heart of Jesus's ministry. Figuratively, Jesus fed his the crowds and his disciples with lessons on the Scriptures. Literally, he fed them with loaves and fishes. Without the latter, the former would have been impossible. If one is hungry, one cannot concentrate on much of anything other than the desire for a meal. Food security is an essential prerequisite for growth in many, many respects—not only spiritual but also physical and economic. For millennia, the church has fed the hungry. Yet today—with climate change and with patterns of economic development that favor those who already have sufficient means—the need remains as great as ever. Both at home and abroad, millions of individuals suffer from malnutrition. Our parish participates in efforts to meet these challenges. Every week, we donate to the Landisville food bank—a ministry coordinated by Beth Lynch. And every April, more than a dozen parishioners pack meals

for the international service agency Feed My Starving Children—a project coordinated by Peg Riley. Beth and Peg involve the children in each of these activities, thereby training the next generation to assume responsibility for feeding the hungry. Almost 2000 years ago, the Apostle John asked rhetorically, “Whoever has the world’s goods, and beholds his brother in need and closes his heart against him, how does the love of God abide in him? Little children, let us not love with word or with tongue, but in deed and truth” (I John 3:17-18). Both as individuals and as a community, may we continue working to meet the needs of our neighbors near and far.

## HEART LIGHT

This Mother's Day, make a bright gift for someone special in your life.



### What you need:

- Scissors
- Cardstock
- Tape

- Paintbrushes
- Battery-operated tea light
- Paper and pen
- Hole punch
- Twine

### What you do:

1. Cut out two cardstock hearts and tape them to the jar sides, near the bottom.
2. Paint the entire jar with primer paint. Let dry.
3. Paint splotches of acrylic paint over the primer. Let dry. Remove the heart shapes.
4. Place the tea light in the jar.

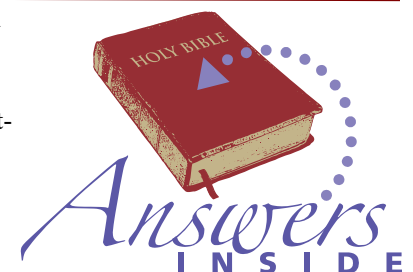

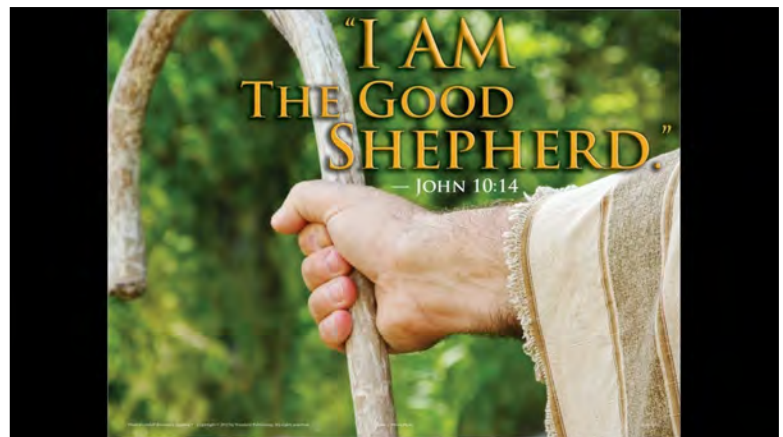
