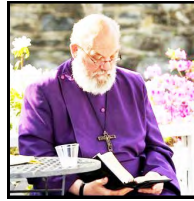

For many families, summer is a time of rest. Children are free from school, and a family vacation—for a long weekend or perhaps for a week or more—provides a welcome respite from quotidian pressures. Tens of thousands of tourists visit Lancaster County each summer, and many of us travel to other locales to seek solace in beaches, mountains, and various natural retreats. Jesus, exhausted by his ministry, sought periodic rest for his disciples and himself. After feeding the five thousand, for example, “Immediately he made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray” (Matthew 14:22-23). Jesus returned refreshed, walking on the water to save his disciples from a squall and then healing the sick at Gennesarat.

After our own summer break, we are returning to a new “church year” filled with Christian Formation, choir rehearsal, and service projects. But let us remember to rest from time to time, not just physically but also spiritually—in our own prayer life and in community at church—so that each Sunday we may depart fulfilled and prepared for another week of work and of service to others both near and far.

We had so much fun shopping for the remaining school supplies with money parishioners had generously donated that we thought we'd take a selfie!

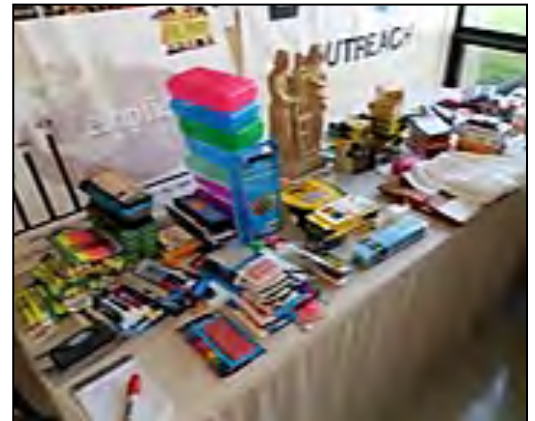
## Sole 4 Souls

## Hempfield Food Pantry

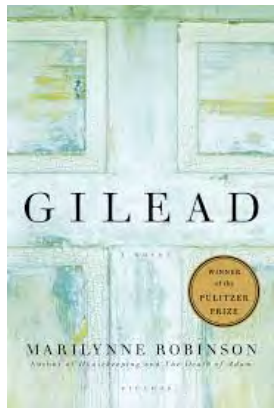

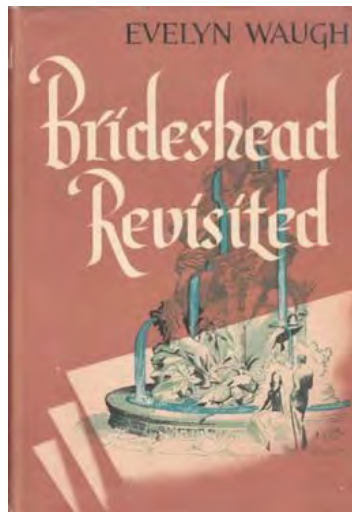
# Book Review: Novels With Faith Elements

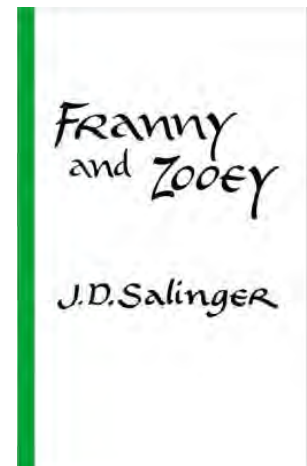
Marilynne Robinson's Pulitzer-prize-winning *Gilead* is set in 1956 at the end of Rev. John Ames's life, when he pens a letter to his young son to explain his family, his history, his relationship with God. The climactic moment of this story is a quiet scene that creeps up on you, making you realize how easy it is to miss great moments of blessing. One of the most profound scenes, though, occurs fairly early when John relates a tale of his abolitionist preacher grandfather being confronted by his son (the narrator's father) about his activities. "I remember when you walked to the pulpit in that shot-up, bloody shirt with that pistol in your belt," the father says, "And I had a thought as powerful and clear as any revelation. And it was, This has *nothing* to do with Jesus. Nothing. Nothing..." The grandfather was on the right side of the Civil War, yet his son chastises him for using his pulpit to push for war.



You don't have to be upper-class British to relate to the characters in Evelyn Waugh's *Brideshead Revisited*, a tale of an aristocratic Catholic family in Anglican England right before World War II. It's a complicated story that might require a cheat sheet for the characters, but the climax is, as in *Gilead*, quiet, yet breathtaking as the estranged husband of Lady Marchmain returns to Brideshead to die and be reconciled with his faith.



The characters in J.D. Salinger's *Franny and Zooey* are as removed from my own life experience as the author's most famous protagonist, Holden Caulfield of *The Catcher in the Rye*, a book that never moved me. While siblings Franny and Zooey come from Holden's same posh New York background, they are, well, less bratty. This book, originally two short stories printed in the *New Yorker*, consists mostly of long conversations between Franny and her brother, as he tries to coax her back to living when she suffers a breakdown. While faith discussions are sprinkled throughout the novel, it is Zooey's patient explanation of who an unattractive "Fat Lady" really was in their late brother Seymour's life that lights up the tale: "And don't you know — *listen* to me, now — *don't you know who that Fat Lady really is?* . . . Ah, buddy. Ah, buddy. It's Christ Himself. Christ Himself, buddy."

# First Church for the Deaf

## Gallaudet and Syle

August 27 Priests 1902, 1890

O loving God, whose will it is that everyone should come to you and be saved: We bless your Holy Name for your servants Thomas Gallaudet and Henry Winter Syle, whose labors with and for those who are deaf we commemorate today; and we pray that you will continually move your Church to respond in love to the needs of all people.

In August many Episcopalians celebrate the feast (appointed feast day Aug, 27) of Thomas Gallaudet, founder of the first church for the Deaf in America, and Henry Winter Syle, the first Deaf clergyman in the United States (Episcopal Deacon, Oct. 8, 1876 - Oct 14, 1883).

## Eighth Grade: A movie review

Middle school may only last three years, but it's a time of significant change, of growing up quickly, of maybe getting your first cellphone or having your first kiss, of discovering what subjects you like in school and whether you can work well in a group, of creating friendships that may last for years to come. Those are all monumental occurrences in the life of a young teenager, and they're what Kayla Day (Elsie Fisher) desperately wants to experience in "Eighth Grade" -- she just hasn't yet.

Kayla is the only daughter of a single father (Josh Hamilton) who adores her but can't quite connect with her because of Kayla's reliance on social media, and the film takes place in that week before eighth grade graduation, when classes have mostly wrapped up and there are only a few months before the end of middle school and the beginning of high school. Most of Kayla's time after school is spent scrolling through Instagram and Twitter, listening to music, and making YouTube videos in which she talks about self-confidence and being yourself -- but those are things Kay-

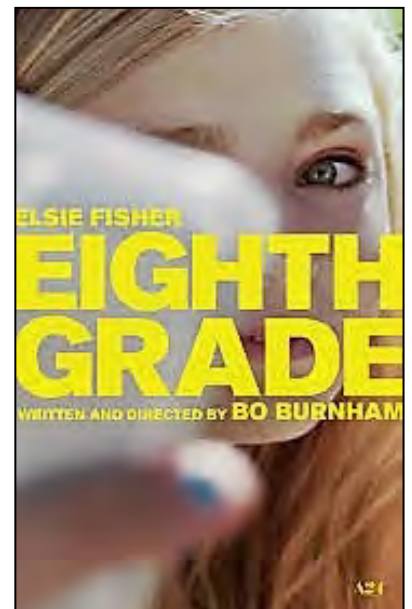
la struggles with every day.

When presented with the time capsule she made in sixth grade, in which Kayla from two years ago made a video asking if eighth-grade Kayla was "cool" or had a boyfriend, present-day Kayla realizes that she's not exactly who she wants to be. But her anxiety and her discomfort with the judgmental, casually cruel popular kids feel like insurmountable obstacles. Her father tells her she's awesome, but his love doesn't seem like enough -- not when it seems like being popular, accepted, and liked is so easy for everyone else.

The teen-movie genre seems to have moved on from presenting an adolescence in which partying, drinking and smoking, and sexual activity are awesome and universal, and "Eighth Grade" makes the point that those activities aren't comfortable for everyone. Kayla's character isn't ready for those behaviors, and her wariness will be a good jumping-off point for conversations between parents and children after the film. The reality is that because of sexual media, tweens and teens are engaging in behaviors that may seem shocking to adults but are everyday normalcy for younger viewers, and "Eighth Grade" provides an opportunity to talk about those issues, gauge where middle school and high school students are on them, and have constructive discussions about what is safe and healthy.

What Kayla goes through is relatable,

and scary, especially in a scene where she hangs out with high school students and a boy takes an interest in her that goes from flattering to dangerous very quickly. How "Eighth Grade" presents these situations while also underlining what makes Kayla's experiences simultaneously common to this age group but unique to her in particular is a deft balancing act, and Kayla will fully capture your heart. "Eighth Grade" is honest, engaging, and enlightening, a film about growing up in the age of social media that has sympathy for teen characters who desperately need it.

An all-Beethoven program of violin/piano sonatas will kick off St. Edward's Cultural Events season this fall with a concert featuring violinist Dana Weiderhold Allaband and pianist Xun Pan on Sunday, September 23 at 3:00 p.m.

The concert will include Sonata No. 2 in A, Op. 12, No. 2; Sonata No. 5 in F, Op. 24 ("Spring"); and Sonata No. 9 in A, Op. 47 ("Kreutzer").

Ms. Weiderhold is principal second violinist with the Lancaster Symphony Orchestra. She's performed with many regional orchestras, including the Baltimore Symphony, and is the recipient of the 2016 LLMEA Private Teacher Award. She coaches chamber music each summer at the Bear Crossing Chamber Music String Camp and Vermont Music and Arts at Lyndon State College, VT. Currently an adjunct professor at Albright College, she maintains a private violin and viola studio located in the heart of London Grove, Pennsylvania.

Xun Pan is very popular in Lancaster and

beyond, a musician who's appeared at St. Edward's multiple times over the past few years, dazzling audiences with his bravura piano playing. Artistic director of the Lancaster International Piano Festival, Chinese-American pianist Xun Pan has performed around the world and is a visiting professor at several Chinese universities. He is on the faculty of Millersville University.

On Friday, October 26, Xun Pan returns to St. Edward's for a piano four-hands program with Yang-Yang, a renowned pianist who has won many international piano competitions.

On Sunday, December 2, the Lancaster Chamber Singers will be performing in the church, and two Sundays later, December 16 at 3:00 p.m., the very popular Hershey Handbell Ensemble will present their annual holiday program at St. Edward's.

All the programs above are free except the Dec. 2 Lancaster Chamber Singers concert.

The free concerts are part of a series of

events at St. Edward's showcasing the church's fellowship outreach, to draw people to our community of faith. Offerings are taken at each program to underwrite costs for the series.

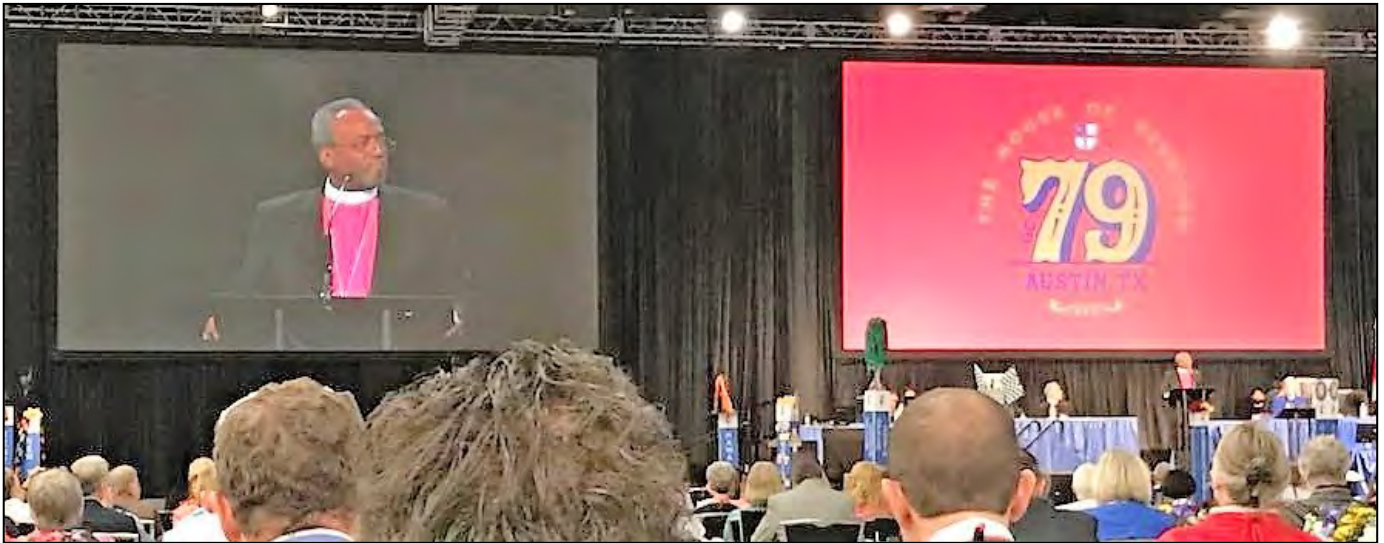

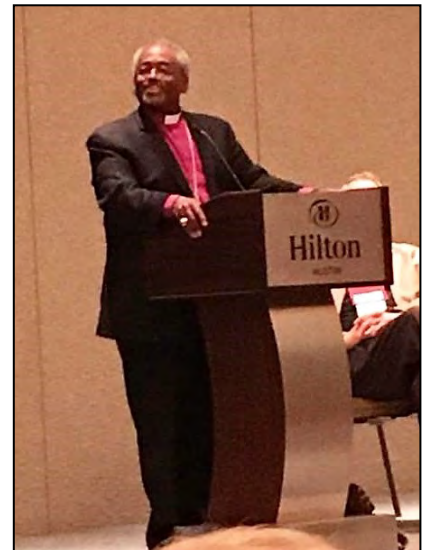

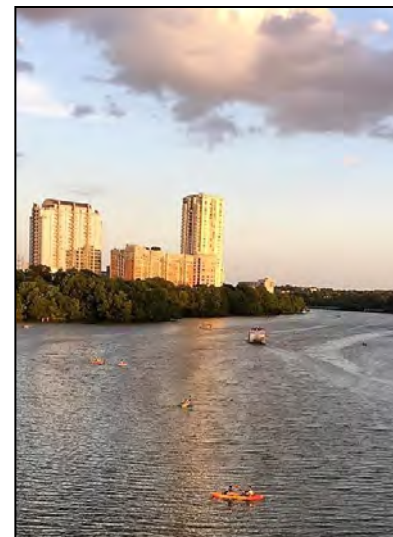
