



Living in Advent Time at St. Edward the Confessor


As I wrote this, we stood at the very threshold of Advent, poised to enter into its mysteries. Advent begins a new year in the life of the church, bringing with it the expectant desire to remember anew the Word made flesh and the longing to come again to that place where human and divine are made one. For most of us, what our lives bring to this intersection has been influenced and deepened through years of retelling this most beloved story. Experiences of darkness and light, of promise and fulfillment have become part of who we are as individuals living and believing within the context of a world that is constantly changing and as it does, changing us as well. At St. Edward's, we are in the unique position of living an Advent life on more than one level- as we prepared to celebrate the Incarnation with our usual liturgies and rituals we were deeply aware of another welcoming that we anticipate, that of a new rector to share ministry with us once we have journeyed through this period of transition. Similar to Advent, transition contains elements of waiting, of longing, of the need to be steadfastly accepting that what we anticipate will not come quickly, nor can it be shortened or rushed.

The Liturgy of the Word has been of great help to us in this vulnerable and bittersweet time; as we heard these familiar texts we sensed a deep connection with those gone before us who not only watched and waited but also heard these texts speak a new thing. On our first Advent Sunday we heard the text of Jeremiah 33:14-16 tell us of coming days when a promise made to God's people will be fulfilled and through it God's people will know righteousness and live in safety. Psalm 25 reminded us that it is God in whom we will put our trust, that He is the God of our salvation in whom we have always trusted. The Epistle from First Thessalonians brought us face to face with joy and a question fundamental to all believers: how can we ever thank God enough for all His gifts, including our understanding that the Gift we anticipate is to be the greatest gift of all? Finally, our Gospel reading emphasized the need for us as a faithful people to be ever alert and watchful, that the waiting we experience on earth is a foreshadowing of our need to be ever ready for that glorious day when all watching and waiting will have been fulfilled in the Kingdom of Heaven.





Can you ever forgive me? : A movie review

"I'm a better Dorothy Parker than Dorothy Parker," says Lee Israel (Melissa McCarthy), in an exasperated tone. She's not kidding.

"Can You Ever Forgive Me?," directed by Marielle Heller, tells a story so irresistible it seems made for the movies. Israel, a cranky Manhattan freelance writer, has fallen on hard times in the early '90s: her editor won't take her calls (unless she pretends to be Nora Ephron), she can't get a book deal, she's falling behind on her rent, and her beloved cat is ailing. What can she do?



Embark on a career as a forger of literary letters, of course! Israel quickly acquires a cadre of vintage typewriters, sharpens up her snark, tilts her TV sideways to use it as a light table, and gets busy creating letters signed by the likes of Parker, Noel Coward, Edna Ferber, Louise Brooks and many more. None of the dealers to whom she sells the letters seem particularly concerned about their provenance; they just hand over the cash. Until they don't.

While the movie isn't exactly a comedy, Heller gives it a cozy rom-com veneer: the soundtrack is jazzy nostalgia (Blossom Dearie, Dinah Washington), the autumntoned Manhattan streets seem quiet and hopeful, the bookstores in which Israel hawks her wares are picturesquely dusty. But a welcome edge is brought by the nastiness of its two central characters. Israel, a casually amoral eccentric, is played by McCarthy without a twinkle; we love this self-absorbed character but never like her. (Watch McCarthy's face curl into a small masterpiece of horror when it's suggested, late in the film, that Lee do some community service.) And her partner in crime, Jack Hock, is likewise nobody you'd ever want to meet; Richard E. Grant plays him with a full inventory of devious swallowed -the-canary grins.

But by the movie's too-quick end, all you

want is to hang out with these two just a little bit longer; to listen to McCarthy's Lee expound on why she broke up with her girlfriend ("She wanted me to listen to her troubles"), and watch her matter-offactly stealing a coat at a party, and root for the doomed spark she seems to be creating with a sweetly unsuspecting bookstore owner (Dolly Wells). And the movie lets Israel have the last laugh, deliciously so. Ms. Parker might well have approved.






