



While we all experienced a deep sense of loss at Stephen and Rayelenn's departure, we seem to be finding our way again now with Rev. David Bateman's leadership. If I were asked to identify one thing that has helped get us through this ongoing transition, I would have to say it is the strength of our community. This sense of family is always apparent at the annual Krist Kindling dinner, where young and old come together on a cold January night to share a meal, stories, and a lot of laughter. Following this year's dinner, someone observed that it is sad that we don't have more opportunities to come together socially to 'break bread' and enjoy each other's company. "And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near. Recognizing the importance of community, especially during this year as we search for a new rector, everyone is invited to gather in the multi-purpose room once a month to eat and talk. At least for now, we have no other agenda or program. Please join us on Wednesday, March 20 at 6 p.m. Bring your own table service and a hot dish and a cold dish to share. We'll see how it goes! We may want to consider adding games or other activities and/or alternative evenings and will be seeking input from those who attend and those who are interested, but unable to attend at that time.

Speaking of community, a church does

not function without the financial support of parishioners. It is challenging for our finance committee to prepare a budget without knowing what income can be counted on. As shown in the most recent finance report, we have lost some substantial pledges (totaling \$25-\$30,000) due to moves, deaths, and retirement. As of February 26, we had received 58 pledges totaling \$164,410 with an average pledge of \$2,849. Right now, our projected deficit for the year is approximately \$30,000. Did you know that the cost of utilities alone to keep our building warm and lit last year was \$10,500?! The majority of your vestry has demonstrated a commitment to St. Edward's through pledging. If you have pledged, thank you so very much. If you have not, please prayerfully consider doing so. As Stewardship Chairperson Susan Landin said to vestry at our February meeting, a pledge is not about the amount you give, it is about commitment to the good work of the parish. Forms are available in the parish office.

At our March 10 meeting, vestry will be electing a junior warden, also known as "the People's Warden." Should you have any concerns or items of business that need to be addressed, please speak to Reverend Bateman or any vestry member so they can be added to our April agenda



Traditional hymns have long been a mainstay of the Episcopal Church. But on the second Sunday of the month, the liturgical music at the 9:10 a.m. service St. Edward's Episcopal Church might turn "Rock of Ages" into rock 'n' roll. That's when St. Edward's 12-member praise band takes the stage.

The band has been around for roughly a quarter of a century and over time has featured performers on trumpets, cellos, guitars and even a viola.

"It sort of grew out of our youth group," Randy Westgate, the band's spokesman, said. "I started learning how to play the guitar when my wife and I were doing the youth group here and found out there was a lot of good, contemporary Christian music out there."

When the youth group would go on retreats, the adult leaders would enlist everyone to sing or play an instrument.

The praise band began with three guitarists playing at 4 p.m. on occasional Sundays.

"It was not an ideal time," Westgate acknowledged.

Eventually the group's music was incorporated into the regular church service.

"Our praise band service is a liturgical service," Westgate said, "very similar to the service you would find in the Episcopal Church."

The group looks for music that fits with the liturgy and the Gospel lesson of the day.

Since the days of that guitar trio, they have added members. Mike Freshwater played guitar with a rock band in the 1960s, but he hadn't picked up a guitar in years until Westgate approached him about playing in the band.

The church, he said, was "looking for a choir director at the time and everything just fell into place," he said.

"The Holy Spirit is always involved," Dina added.

At last year's Christmas Eve service, they performed what Westgate described as "contemplative" music.

"Randy does a lot of arranging and will score out music for the flute or violin," Freshwater said.

Occasional blended services

The church also has occasional blended services in which the praise band and the choir perform.

Ellen Milligan said one of the most enjoyable parts of the praise band service occurs during the recessional.

"When we get to the last song, we pass out instruments — maracas — and anyone who wants to can play along," she said.



Later in life she immersed herself in charitable work to help orphans and the homeless. She helped found New York's first private orphanage and was known to bring homeless

children into her home.




