


It's something of a marathon


A Different Kind of Easter



De drie kruisen The Three Crosses e naald, met lichte plaattoon, op perkament, ca. 1653 | point, with plate tone, on vellum, c. 1653

Christ hangs from the Cross between two thieves and is surroun-ded by apostles, his mother, followers and soldiers. This monu-mental sheet is the pendant to Christ Presented to the People (on the opposite partition wall). Just as there, this scene is fully executed in drypoint, which had almost never been done before. Moreover, Rembrandt pulled the print on costly vellum.







Rembrandt stages the scene with a multitude of figures, each responding individually to the events on the dais. Pilate, with the long staff, points at Christ and leaves the choice to the people to release either 'the King of the Jews' or the murderer Barabbas. The outcome is known. Rembrandt created this enormous scene entirely in drypoint, scratching directly into the conpendate

and Easter from the Rijks Museum.

Dear friends,

Our April vestry meeting began with an overview of church finance presented by Kevin Milligan.

We remain a concerning \$14,000 behind our budgeted income. We reviewed the budget which is pretty much "bare bones," and determined that no substantial cuts can be made. In 2018 Easter was in March, Easter, of course, tends to be a higher attendance and larger giving Sunday, thus making this a contributing factor to lower revenue in March of this year as compared to last. As previously stated, we lost considerable income due to moves, deaths, and retirement and a substantial one-time donation made last year. We need to increase our membership. Meanwhile, the church continues to count on the generosity of all of you.

With our deficit in mind, vestry has invited Chad Linder, Canon of Finance and Operations for the Diocese of Central PA, to speak on Stewardship to help and on starting an Endowment Fund at our June retreat, to help us become financially stable. We are working on organizing a Fundraising Committee to brainstorm and help implement fundraising ideas.

Safeguarding God's Children Training was attended by 13members of our congregation. At least five others completed the on-line version. This is a great first step in becoming compliant with state, Federal and diocesan regulations. It also puts us well on our way to becoming a church that makes the safety and well-being of children a priority. Our commitment conveys an important message to visitors and newcomers and creates an atmosphere of caring and commitment to the families we serve. Our goal is to have everyone who is in contact with children trained in the very near future. The next available training is to be offered at the Episcopal Cathedral in Harrisburg on a Saturday morning after Easter.

Forty people attended the second monthly Community Fellowship Dinner on April 10. Father Bateman started off the evening with a blessing. (See article). Through an informal survey of those who attended, we learned that people like having time together with "no program and no agenda." People enjoy bringing dishes to share with minimal set up clean up, all with little planning. Almost everyone said they like the 6-7:30 p.m. time frame, which allows them to get on with their evening and get home before dark. We hope you'll join us on May 15 at 6 p.m.

Early in May we will be meeting with the Chamber Singers to renew their contract for rehearsal and performance space.

Another date to put on your calendar is the May 5 "Sweaty Sunday"/Cinco de Mayo party. Details can be found on page 7.

On behalf of the Search Committee. Susan Landin reported that most of the surveys are in. The committee's expectation is that it will take about a year from now for us to be ready to call our new rector. The committee plans to post progress on a chart in the multi-purpose room.

Vestry voted to become involved with Embrace Lancaster's Open House following the Lancaster Pride Fest in July. St. Edward's will be on a list of churches that are open to and affirming of LGBTQ persons. We will welcome visitors at the 10:15 service and coffee hour on July 21 and, on that day, will display a Rainbow flag as a sign of our inclusiveness.

A generous donor has stepped forward with a donation for this expense. Another donor has offered to take care of removing a dead tree by the Memorial Garden. Bill Swiernik is getting an estimate on rekeying the locks, while Mike Freshwater is seeking an estimate on getting a "Dutch Door" for the nursery. We will also be addressing other safety concerns in the nursery in the coming months.

Vestry liaisons reported back on committee "happenings." Already this seems to be helping with communication "flow." News of note:

The Cultural Events Committee has exhausted its list of performers and needs to create a new one. The committee would like to offer programs that are less expensive and that offer more diversity.

Social Outreach will once again hold a Back to School Drive for backpacks and supplies, July 28-August 4. These are distributed to needy children in the Hempfield School District through the Landisville Food Bank.

The Memorial Garden Committee is working to get the memorial plaques moved outside.


There is a need for new membership in several committees, including Altar Guild, LEMs and Acolytes, and Greeters and Ushers. Can you help?





This is the article that St. John's sent me that explains about the final Count of shoes for Soles 4 Souls. We donated 408 pairs which is just shy of 25%.

Soles for Souls has been a "community" project here at St. John's for a number of years.

2019 was again, a Lancaster "community" reaching out in caring to a world "community" by providing shoes that go all over the world.

Our Lancaster community is St. John's members and their friends at work, in various neighborhoods.

St. John's Methodist in Paradise has partnered with us for several years, as has John Beck Elementary School in Lititz.

This year our local community also included St. Edwards, James Street Mennonite, Lancaster City donors as well as folks at Landis Homes.

Phoenix Courier has since the start of our gathering, partnered to pick up without any payment and deliver the shoes

to New Jersey where they are sorted and distributed.

Without their caring help, we would have to raise money at \$1/pair to be picked up and transported.

A simple pair of shoes can keep people from dealing with diseases, allow children to go to school, etc.

Imagine if you had to walk to church on any Sunday from your home barefooted in varying weather.

Some of the shoes we get are brand new, some barely worn and some have had some journeys.

Those with greater adventures are used to teach people in varied countries how to repair shoes and can then be a new life with a job.

Every year, our young people staying over night on Maundy Thursday line up and pass the boxes of shoes from the church onto the truck.

If you've ever watched them in this project, the smiles on their faces extends to their hearts and something they won't forget.

Get ready to smile as you read that this year we collected......1744 pairs!








