Last weekend your parish representatives — Ted Cardwell, Dina Ishler, Susan Landin and Amy Swiernik — and I attended the annual convention of the diocese of Central Pennsylvania. This year it was held in Harrisburg, though it rotates around the diocese. (You may remember that a few years ago it was in Lancaster and the worship was held here at St. Edward's.)

This year was a bit different and may be remembered as the most important convention in the diocese in quite a long while. What made it different was the introduction and rollout of something that Bishop Audrey has been gradually been imagining, praying about and planning for the four years since she first arrived in Central PA.

Its name is "Shaped By Faith" and it is a program designed to provide our diocese with the assistance and talent to make new decisions about how to carry out local ministry in each corner of the diocese in a time of shrinking resources of money and people. It is outward-looking, encouraging us to think about how we are called to serve the communities closest to us. Shaped By Faith has no



specific predetermined outcomes; individual congregations and parishioners will decide how best to use local and regional resources to do the ministry of God's work in each place where we are. But it gives congregations new tools: free learning opportunities at the Bishop Stevenson School, a trained panel of consultant guides, and a guided decisionmaking process.

A number of congregations in the northern part of our diocese, some of whom are already particularly hard hit by loss of members and resources, have already signed on to be among the first groups to try the Shaped By Faith process. Detailed planning will take place over the next two years or so, followed by implementation after that.

We'll be hearing more about Shaped By Faith in the months ahead. For now at St. Edward's, we are mostly just in a listening and learning mode since the period we are now in — the latter half of a transition — is not the right time to implement a new program.

But as we hear more about what Shaped By Faith offers, the people of St. Edward's can begin to start wondering what the combination of a new permanent rector and new diocesan resources could possibly mean for our future.

Good news! The parish profile has been completed. Vestry has approved a compensation package for the new rector. The parish profile is posted on the St. Edward's web site. We expect to receive applications in the next three to six weeks, after which the interview process will begin.

I am delighted to report the Julie Hoff will serve as Junior Warden, replacing Susan Landin who resigned in August. Ginny Kloepping will take Susan's spot on vestry. Both positions will continue until the election at annual meeting. Also, I'm happy to report that Dick and Gail Irons, together with Steve and Catherine Donohue, and Jamie Alton will head up this year's Stewardship campaign.

On the financial front, we are \$12,000 over budget, YTD. While this is not, of course, where we would like to be, it is under the projected \$18,000 YTD, which is good news indeed. December tends to be a "good" month financially, so we remain hopeful that our year end deficit will be considerably less than anticipated. Another financial plus is the receipt of the Diocesan loan and grant this month. Cost of the renovated nursery, which looks fabulous and inviting, was covered by the grant. The decals are on the walls now. Do stop in and take a look and be sure to thank Camille Horine for her vision, design work and labor of love and also helpers Michelle Bentley and Bev Hess; and Mike Freshwater, Mark Jakiel, and Ellen Milligan who painted and replaced the toy shelves and other accessories

Funds from the loan are being used to pay for other necessary renovations. Progress in building repairs and improvements are largely visible, to pay for other necessary renovations.

Building repairs and renovations seem to take two steps forward and one step back. The new tile floor in the Sacristy had several large "bubbles," and was replaced at no charge by the contractor. The water heater replacement was under budget. Vestry approved moving forward with repair of the rotted window sill in the sacristy. Next up is repair of the rotting window sill and wall in the rector's office and the mold in the narthex ceiling. A routine "check-up" of our HVAC system in the parish hall, revealed a broken coil in the A/

C system which will cost an estimated \$3200 to repair. As this does not affect the heat, vestry voted to postpone repair until next spring. The door from the Parish Hall to the front walkway is rusting. Michelle is getting estimates for repair or replacement.

If you haven't logged onto the St. Ed's website, do check out its new look. With some input from Search Committee (and before), Michelle has worked very hard to update information, add pictures, and flesh out details about our ministries and events. She also added a youth page which lists local and Diocesan activities. Thanks to her efforts, the site is also easier to navigate.

Bill Swiernik is in ongoing negotiation with the gentleman that farms our property north of the creek to establish a formal agreement. At the farmer's request, vestry agreed to cover half the cost of the \$1400 in legal fees.

Bev Hess attended the October vestry meeting to present a plan for a stone monument to display plaques bearing names of persons whose ashes are interred in the memorial garden. Since the Memorial Garden committee has enough money to erect the monument, at an estimated cost of \$4600, vestry voted to allow the committee to proceed with plans. Vestry and the

October 20th Adult Forum - The Opioid Crisis in Our Community

Doug Cwienk, a Certified Family Recovery Specialist presented an informative and oh- so-relevant talk on the Opioid Crisis at a special adult form on Sunday, October 20 in the Parish Hall. By day, Doug is senior hydrogeologist at David Miller Associates in Lancaster. Doug is also co-founder of a support group for families dealing with addiction, called "Storm Riders." Doug explained the chemistry of addiction and how opioids affect the brain and lead users down the path of addiction. As the father of Nate, who died of an overdose in 2017 at the age of 22, Doug is uniquely qualified to share his personal experience with addiction and the effects of addiction on the family and loved ones of an addicted person. An audience of about 35 parishioners and guests came away with a better understanding of opioid addiction and its profound effects on families and communities. Some in attendance shared their own personal experience with family members in in the throes of addiction and of loved ones lost to overdose. It was a powerful message of the destructive power of drugs and also a message of hope.






From the Finance Committee:

On behalf of the Vestry, I would like to provide a brief snapshot of the Parish's financial situation at the end of September. We continue to have a smaller operating deficit than was budgeted. Specifically, for the month of September our Net Ordinary Income deficit was only about \$340. Further, for the Year to Date our Net Ordinary Income deficit is about \$12,000 less than was budgeted. As you can see in the accompanying chart, Operating Income for the Third Quarter was slightly less than in 2018 but ahead of 2017.

The generosity and faithfulness of the Parish are evident in the steady giving throughout 2019. We thank you for your continued support.


