Vestry

March seems like the month that wasn't. No vestry meeting, annual meeting, and Sundays with no services. What a peculiar world we are living in!

On March 4, after a year's search, we announced the name of our new rector – Rev. Richard C. Bauer, who comes to us from St. James.

In early March, renovations continued. On March 2nd, we learned the Formica on the old cabinet in the kitchen was no longer available. The construction company submitted a supplemental to the insurance company saying they could not get an exact match and requesting replacement of all the cabinets for conformity. The insurance company approved the expense. The grease trap has been replaced. A few weeks ago, renovations screeched to a halt. The construction of the Narthex ceiling and the completion of the kitchen floor and cabinets were on hold due to the closure of non-life sustaining business. Just today we learned that Reynold's has received the go-ahead to resume work. With no one using the building, this will actually work out very well for us.

Vestry announced some technical changes in the by-laws, which had not been updated since 1997 – things like changing "vicar" to "rector" and "mission" to "parish." If there are no objections to these changes, vestry will approve them soon.

Sunday March 15 marked the last services (and any other meetings and activities) until at least March 29 or possibly longer due to the Coronavirus. On the 16th, we formed a "buddy system" matching the "able-bodied" to parishioners who are elderly and those who may be feeling isolated during this time of confinement at home. Within hours, almost everyone had a connection. Michelle began a wonderful daily post of prayer and positivity on the website and via email, to help comfort parishioners during this national health crisis. Father David has offered up his Sunday sermons and some words of encouragement for all of us.

As you may know, as per the direction from Bishop Scanlan, the church will not be open for worship or activities prior to the end of May, at the earliest. The Bishop meets with clergy, via zoom, weekly, so the parish office is constantly updated and we will pass those updates on to you, in a timely manner. Meanwhile, there will be diocesan service offerings for Palm Sunday and Holy Week and St. Edward's will be offering our own Easter service online. We still have the business of our Annual Meeting which we are pulling together reports and plans to hold virtually, with a target date of April 18th, via zoom, so stay tuned. This will be led by Father David and will allow us to start anew with our permanent rector, Father Rick and a new vestry in place.

After conversations with Father David, Father Rick, and a consultation with Bishop Scanlan, I will stay on as Senior Warden for one year to help with the transition and to try to provide some continuity. There is precedence for this at St. Edward's – Brian Newsome was asked by Father Stephen Casey to stay on for a second year as Senior Warden last year.

With Father David's last day of April 19th approaching, you can email him at rector@sainteds.org to bid farewell and he is in our directory for his address. We hope to have Father David return to St. Edward's for a celebration of his ministry in the near future once we are back in community in the church.

Father Rick's first day in the office will be on April 21. His first official service will be on April 26, assuming we are back to a new normal. Please continue to pray for Father David as his time with us winds down and also for Father

"Due to, what I believe is, the unprecedented Diocesan closure of churches, we are a bit behind schedule with the 2020 Budget. But the Vestry is currently reviewing the Finance Committee's draft budget and we expect to have it finalized soon. In the interim, I wanted to share with the Parish a summary of the most recent draft budget.

Houses of worship may be closed over coronavirus concerns, but bills still must be paid

Earlier this week, St. Edward's Episcopal Church, 2453 Harrisburg Pike, sent its members an email describing the parish's reaction to temporarily suspending activities and use of the church building.

As part of that email, the Rev. David Bateman, interim rector, stated that in addition to prayers, calls and cards, "There is one more thing you can do to support St. Edward's during this time. Please keep up to date with your pledge or regular contribution."

It is a reminder that many houses of worship are passing along to members.

Churches and synagogues are closed and Masses are suspended, but bills still need to be paid.

That's where online giving comes into play. In this increasingly technological era, churches are using online services to meet demand.

At Calvary Church, 1051 Landis Valley Road, roughly 25% of the weekly offering number, and we can walk them through is done online.

The church's website lists any number of Parish ways people can give, including onetime bookkeeping and financial services for gifts and online recurring giving.

"We now encourage people to look to use the (online) option," said the Rev. Beau Eckert, senior pastor.

While Calvary created its own online app, there are other options for churches.

Kate Good, executive director at the Parish Resource Center, said her organization has compiled information from area churches that use online giving and has used that information to help other churches choose the option that best fits their needs.

Of the churches with which the center has worked, most use Vanco Payment Solutions Inc., an Atlanta-based firm that advertises it has helped more than 20,000 friendly. churches "grow their giving."

Other popular online giving platforms in- 119 S. Prince St., parishioners can click clude Pushpay, which is used by LCBC, the giving link to contribute. The church and Elexio, a Lancaster-based software lists a variety of reasons for members to

ed Methodist Church.

"It's not very hard to set up," Good said. "Churches fill out a form with their tax ID it."

Resource Centeralso offers churches and nonprofits. Currently, 20 churches and nonprofits use those services.

"We have a CPA who oversees all of it, so they're getting top-level support at really affordable rates," she said.

Not only is online giving secure, Good said the services provide receipts to both Senior pastor, Calvary Church the giver and the institution so it's easier to track contributions.

There are fees for processing the credit or **Editor's note:** debit card, and many of the sites allow the giver to assume the fee so the church is not being charged to process it.

It also is important for churches to make sure the system they choose is mobile-

At historic St. Mary's Catholic Church, company, which is used by Covenant Unit- give online: no need to write checks or

bring cash; contributing even when the person is unable to attend; all contributions are recorded on the giver's bank statement; and the fact that it is costfree.

St. Edward's Episcopal Church used Pay-Pal several years ago but abandoned it after few members used it. The church currently does not offer an online option and instead has asked members to mail checks to the church.

St. Edward's is putting together a team to participate in the Bishop Audrey's, Shaped By Faith initiative. Each parish is asked to put together a team of 3 to 4 people to attend 9 meetings during the next 18 months. Ideal teams consist of; the rector, a vestry person and a parishioner in the pews, for a total of 3, but 4 could be accommodated. Currently, Julie Hoff and our new Rector Rick Bauer are on this team. We are seeking at least one additional layperson to join this team. This will be an 18 month commitment with meetings every other month with other churches in the Lancaster Convocation. Meeting 2 will be happening by Zoom on Sunday March 29th from 1-2 pm.

What is Shaped By Faith?

Our Diocese has embarked upon a huge project called, "Shaped by Faith", where regional groups of parishes are examining their future together and their optimal configurations for health, vitality and values, financial sustainability, God's call in the neighborhood, and new models for being Church. Together we are taking on this necessary, change-oriented work to build a diocese for the future that is vibrant, life giving, sustainable and God driven.

We have this common goal together as a diocese. At the very first town hall style gathering, congregations engaged in a visioning process with four guiding words: Discovery, Experimentation, Creativity and Collaboration. The entire process for Shaped by Faith relies on all parishes and convocations collaborating with one another as we explore together what the future looks like for our dio-

cese. Working together first in teams within the parish, and then, those same teams coming together to work on the next set of tools in the process, building trust, and a common sense of 'we are in this together'.

Togetherness is fostering relationships between parishes that result in new ways of doing and being church. For example: there may be collaboration on shared resources where one parish administrator is producing the bulletins for two or three churches, instead of each creating their own. Two parishes may decide a more permanent collaboration will enhance their communities and they will join to form one parish. It's possible a parish will form new collaborations with community-based services, such as housing Family Services in a portion of their building. Will a parish 'rent' their building to another denomination to hold services on Sunday afternoon or another day the congregation isn't using the physical building?

The possibilities are limitless. I'm imagining as this process unfolds, the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania will have a wide variety of collaborations never before dreamed and our togetherness will be enhanced exponentially as we seek to build the kingdom of God, because we have done this work collaborating together.





Episcopal Home to Close

To all Clergy and Members of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania,

For over 93 years, the mission of the Episcopal Home has been to provide the elderly in Central Pennsylvania a safe, loving community and a supported living environment where they can receive the care they need. Through its long history, the Episcopal Home has been able to maintain the personal dignity of every resident and provide quality care for all those who have chosen to make their home with us. The support of the diocese through the years - both financial support and untold hours of service - has helped us to care for the residents' physical, emotional and spiritual needs. Thank you for joining us



so faithfully in this mission of compassion and care.

It is with saddened hearts that we inform you that The Episcopal Home is no longer financially sustainable as a care facility and will be closing effective September 30, 2020. While this is an immensely sad XI Bishop time for us all, the Board came to this decision after lengthy, prayerful and prudent discernment. In the past five years, the Board has explored new efforts in fundraising, marketing, and financial management with results that have been good, but not robust enough to allow for sustainability. The trends today in eldercare and healthcare in our Commonwealth do not favor independent personal care homes, and the difficulties that we have been experiencing in maintaining our vitality are not uncommon. In the past, the diocese has been very generous in supporting the Home, and we are grateful. The margin of loss is not one that even a strident mission effort in our diocese could sustain; an endowment with a principle of ten million dollars would be necessary to ensure a sustainable draw to meet the annual deficit of recent years.

We ask not only for your prayers during this period of transition, but for assistance where able. We are committed to ensuring excellent care for the residents as we work to assist their families and responsible parties to resettle them in alternative facilities and housing, work to alleviate distress, and provide spiritual guidance during this time. Any who are able to volunteer their time and services to ensure the residents are safe and cared for are greatly appreciated. If you would like to learn more about how you can help, please contact the Administrator of the Home, Canon Mary Grace Shearer, at the number listed at the bottom of this page.

Additional details will be available about plans for The Episcopal Home properties. We look forward to working with the congregation at St. Andrew's, The Rev. Barbara Hutchinson, Rector, and the diocese's Council of Trustees as we look to the future and the stewardship of this place. Thank you for being a part of the Home with us.







St. Gertrude Patron Saint of Cats ...More or Less



You might think of March 17 as St. Patrick's Day, but it's also the feast day of a lesser-known saint: Gertrude of Nivelles, patron saint of cats. At least that's what the internet says.

Gertrude of Nivelles was born around 626 in present-day Belgium into a wellconnected noble family. But she didn't stick to the script that most noble women were made to follow in her era: When she was 10, Gertrude reportedly refused loudly and angrily—to be married to the son of a duke. In fact, she insisted that she would never marry at all.

When her father died, Gertrude and her mother, Itta, moved to Nivelles (south of present-day Brussels) to set up a monastery, where she became an abbess. She became known for her devotion to scholarly and charitable works, and for taking care of orphans, widows, and pilgrims. She was also visited by spiritual visions and said to know most of the Bible by heart. But her ascetic lifestyle, which in-

cluded long periods without food or sleep, took a toll on her health, and she resigned as abbess in 656 at the age of 30. She died three years later, and St. Patrick himself is said to have watched over her on her deathbed.

Sailors--who were crossing a sea while on business for Gertrude's monastery--were caught in a ferocious storm and threatened by a large sea animal who they feared would capsize their boat. After one of the sailors prayed to God for mercy because they were doing business for Gertrude's ministry work, they said that the storm miraculously stopped right away and the sea creature swam away from them.

Cats and Mice

Since Gertrude was known for offering hospitality (to people as well as animals), she was kind to the cats that hung around her monastery, offering them food and affection. Gertrude is also associated with cats because she often prayed for the souls of people in purgatory, and artists of the time symbolized those souls as mice, which cats like to chase. Therefore, Gertrude came to be linked with both cats and mice and now serves as the patron saint of cats.

While the Search Committee looked far and wide for a new rector, they found the person who fit our profile almost in our own back yard. It is an honor to introduce In his cover letter to the Search Committo you the next rector of St. Edward's: The Reverend Richard C. Bauer.

Father Rick has been serving as Associate Rector at St. James in Lancaster since June of 2018. As part of his ministry there, he has worked hard to lift up ministries in our community that promote the dignity of all people and has developed strong relationships with clergy women and men in our convocation and diocese.

Rick will soon finish course work for a Doctor of Ministry in Christian Leadership from Duke Divinity School. As a student there, he has honed the craft of ministry with work in parish administration, strategic planning, multi-media practices, preaching in politically diverse contexts and outreach ministries. In addition to his nearly completed doctorate, Rick holds a nik, Peter Weber, Susan Landin, Seth Master of Divinity from Virginia Theological Seminary; a Master of Arts in Religious Studies from Florida International University; and a B.S. in Legal Studies from Nova Southeastern University.

An accomplished musician (vocalist, guitarist, bassist, and keyboardist) Father Rick self-recorded and produced 9 full-length C.D.'s. and maintained a full-time performance schedule with "the Rick Bauer Band." Through his Roads to Rome Productions in Hollywood, Florida, he served for 15 years as an ordained nondenominational minister, proprietor, performer, booking agent, and producer.

Father Rick's many academic awards during his years at Virginia Theological Seminary include an award for Christian Leadership, a Biblical Language Prize, an Award and Scholarship for Academic Excellence in Theology, a Scholarship for Academic Excellence and another for Theological Reflection, and a Doctoral Fellowship for Study: Catholic University, PhD. Religion and Culture. Rick was a Florida Academic Scholar, 1993-1997 and completed his undergraduate education on a full academic scholarship.

In his free time, Rick engages his passions for study, travel, music, and family. As an extension of his graduate work in Religious Studies, he seeks opportunities to engage different cultures, and, in fifteen viVibcyYLuaz-QY5RFqQ&index=13 trips abroad has explored many of the top world UNESCO sites, Stonehenge including the Pyramids at Giza, the Vatican, the Taj Mahal, Machu Picchu, the Temple complexes at Angkor, and Chichen Itza.

Rick and his wife Katrina live right here in East Hempfield and are the proud parents of two sons, Richard and Christian, who attend Centerville Elementary School.


