The Officiant says to the people

Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Silence may be kept.

Officiant and People together, all kneeling

Most merciful God,
we confess that we have sinned against you
in thought, word, and deed,
by what we have done,
and by what we have left undone.
We have not loved you with our whole heart;
we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.
We are truly sorry and we humbly repent.

For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

Almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us all our sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen us in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep us in eternal life. *Amen.*

The Invitatory and Psalter

Officiant O God, make speed to save us.

People O Lord, make haste to help us.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be forever. Amen.

Except in Lent, add Alleluia.

The following, or some other suitable hymn, or an Invitatory Psalm, may be sung or said.

¹⁹They made a calf at Horeb* and worshiped a cast image.

- ²⁰ They exchanged the glory of God *^[a] for the image of an ox that eats grass.
- ²¹ They forgot God, their Savior,* who had done great things in Egypt,
- ²² wondrous works in the land of Ham,* and awesome deeds by the Red Sea. ^[b]
- ²³ Therefore he said he would destroy them—had not Moses, his chosen one, stood in the breach before him,*

to turn away his wrath from destroying them.

- ²⁴Then they despised the pleasant land,* having no faith in his promise.
- ²⁵ They grumbled in their tents, * and did not obey the voice of the LORD.
- ²⁶Therefore he raised his hand and swore to them * that he would make them fall in the wilderness,
- ²⁷ and would disperse^[c] their descendants among the nations, * scattering them over the lands.
- ²⁸Then they attached themselves to the Baal of Peor, * and ate sacrifices offered to the dead;
- ²⁹ they provoked the LORD to anger with their deeds, * and a plague broke out among them.
- ³⁰ Then Phinehas stood up and interceded, * and the plague was stopped.
- ³¹And that has been reckoned to him as righteousness * from generation to generation forever.
- ³² They angered the LORD^[d] at the waters of Meribah, * and it went ill with Moses on their account;
- ³³ for they made his spirit bitter, * and he spoke words that were rash.
- ³⁴They did not destroy the peoples, * as the LORD commanded them,
- ³⁵ but they mingled with the nations * and learned to do as they did.
- ³⁶They served their idols, * which became a snare to them.
- ³⁷ They sacrificed their sons * and their daughters to the demons;
- they poured out innocent blood, the blood of their sons and daughters, *

whom they sacrificed to the idols of Canaan; and the land was polluted with blood.

- ³⁹ Thus they became unclean by their acts, * and prostituted themselves in their doings.
- ⁴⁰Then the anger of the LORD was kindled against his people, * and he abhorred his heritage;
- ⁴¹ he gave them into the hand of the nations, * so that those who hated them ruled over them.
- ⁴²Their enemies oppressed them, * and they were brought into subjection under their power.
- ⁴³ Many times he delivered them, but they were rebellious in their purposes, * and were brought low through their iniquity.
- ⁴⁴ Nevertheless he regarded their distress * when he heard their cry.
- ⁴⁵ For their sake he remembered his covenant, * and showed compassion according to the abundance of his steadfast love.
- ⁴⁶ He caused them to be pitied * by all who held them captive.
- ⁴⁷ Save us, O LORD our God, and gather us from among the nations, * that we may give thanks to your holy name and glory in your praise.
- ⁴⁸ Blessed be the LORD, the God of Israel, from everlasting to everlasting. *
 And let all the people say, "Amen."

Praise the LORD!

The Lessons

One or two lessons, as appointed, are read, the Reader first saying

A Reading (Lesson) from 2 Thessalonians 2:1-17

2 As to the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and our being gathered together to him, we beg you, brothers and sisters, a to the edictive you have to be quickly shaken in mind or alarmed, either by spirit or by word or by letter, as though from us, to the effect that the day of the Lord is already here. Let no one deceive you in any way; for that day will not come unless the rebellion comes first and the lawless one is revealed, the one destined for destruction. Let He opposes and exalts himself above every so-called god or object of worship, so that he takes his seat in the temple of God, declaring himself to be God. Do you not remember that I told you these things when I was still with you? And you know what is now restraining him, so that he may be revealed when his time comes. For the mystery of lawlessness is already at work, but only until the one who now restrains it is removed. And then the lawless one will be revealed, whom the Lord Jesus will destroy with the breath of his mouth, annihilating him by the manifestation of his coming. The coming of the lawless one is apparent in the working of Satan, who uses all power, signs, lying wonders, and every kind of wicked deception for those who are perishing, because they refused to love the truth and so be saved. For this reason God sends them a powerful delusion, leading them to believe what is false, to that all who have not believed the truth but took pleasure in unrighteousness will be condemned.

¹³ But we must always give thanks to God for you, brothers and sisters^[f] beloved by the Lord, because God chose you as the first fruits^[g] for salvation through sanctification by the Spirit and through belief in the truth. ¹⁴ For this purpose he called you through our proclamation of the good news,^[h] so that you may obtain the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. ¹⁵ So then, brothers and sisters,^[i] stand firm and hold fast to the traditions that you were taught by us, either by word of mouth or by our letter.

¹⁶ Now may our Lord Jesus Christ himself and God our Father, who loved us and through grace gave us eternal comfort and good hope, ¹⁷ comfort your hearts and strengthen them in every good work and word.

After each Lesson the Reader may say

Reader The Word of the Lord.

People Thanks be to God.

Silence may be kept after each Reading.

Amen.

A Collect for Fridays

Lord Jesus Christ, by your death you took away the sting of death: Grant to us your servants so to follow in faith where you have led the way, that we may at length fall asleep peacefully in you and wake up in your likeness; for your tender mercies' sake. Amen.

A Collect for Saturdays

O God, the source of eternal light: Shed forth your unending day upon us who watch for you, that our lips may praise you, our lives may bless you, and our worship on the morrow give you glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

A Collect for Peace

Most holy God, the source of all good desires, all right judgements, and all just works: Give to us, your servants, that peace which the world cannot give, so that our minds may be fixed on the doing of your will, and that we, being delivered from the fear of all enemies, may live in peace and quietness; through the mercies of Christ Jesus our Savior. Amen.

A Collect for Aid against Perils

A Collect for the Presence of Christ

Lord Jesus, stay with us, for evening is at hand and the day is past; be our companion in the way, kindle our hearts, and awaken hope, that we may know you as you are revealed in Scripture and the breaking of bread. Grant this for the sake of your love. *Amen.*

And, we pray, give us such an awareness of your mercies, that with truly thankful hearts we may show forth your praise, not only with our lips, but in our lives, by giving up our selves to your service, and by walking before you in holiness and righteousness all our days; through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, be honor and glory throughout all ages. Amen.

A Prayer of St. Chrysostom (BCP, p.126)

Almighty God, you have given us grace at this time with one accord to make our common supplication to you; and you have promised through your well-beloved Son that when two or three are gathered together in his Name you will be in the midst of them: Fulfill now, O Lord, our desires and petitions as may be best for us; granting us in this world knowledge of your truth, and in the age to come life everlasting. *Amen.*
