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
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# Reflection From the Rector's Desk



Still knee-deep in Christmas cards and wrapping paper and still dwelling on the story of Mary, I find it hard to propel myself into January. Still, I don't think any of us will deeply miss the year 2020!

Looking back, I am very proud of all that was accomplished at St. Edward's last year. Father Rick jumped in feet first and, it seems, never stopped to catch his breath. Michelle, too, activated her reserves and kept going like the energizer bunny. Vestry and many parishioners stepped up to the plate, offering time, talent, and financial support. I'm sure I don't need to make a detailed list, so I will just mention the highlights - the Memorial Garden "makeover," redesigned space for Wednesday noon services; new carpet in the sanctuary; a prayer corner... For the first time in two years, we did not need to discuss build-

ing "issues" at the December vestry meeting. In addition to improvements to our physical space, we adapted to Covid with livestreamed and recorded services, launched a Wednesday evening Bible study and Friday Lunch and Learn via Zoom. We continued our outreach projects, specifically supporting the Hempfield Food Pantry and the Jesse Tree project. Beyond all that, I think the most remarkable thing about 2020 was that we, as a congregation, managed to stay connected even though many of us have been unable to set foot in the church since last February. Father Rick looked out for us and we looked out for each

So, what did Vestry discuss at the December meeting? There were enough topics to keep us engaged for nearly three hours. Our expected deficit for 2021 is \$24,978. Vestry approved the draft budget with the addition of line item for Father Rick's installation service, which is tentatively planned for April 21, 2021 de-pending on the status of Covid. The good news is that, as of our meeting on December 17, the church office had re-ceived 67 Stewardship pledges (up from 61 last year) totaling \$197,330, with an additional \$12,000 expected still to come in.

Representing the Finance Committee, Kevin Milligan and Mark Jakiel ex-pressed concern about cash flow during these months of online only services. Thankfully, pledge payments are coming in, but it is critical that everyone continues get them in on time.

The Jesse Tree project, spearheaded by Leslie Arnold, provided about 35 children from COBYS Family Services with pajamas, "fluffy" socks, and \$35 each in Amazon gift cards. Beth Lynch, Leslie, Kevin Milligan, and I wrapped the boxes assembly line style, one Sunday afternoon. Beth Lynch announced that we will resume collection of shoes for the Soles 4 Souls project February 14 through Good Friday.

Those of you who participated in Krist Kindling, please plan to attend our virtual "reveal" party on the evening of January 10. Please bring your stories and a snack and drink or dessert and coffee and join the fun on Zoom at 7 p.m. I will be sending out a link a few days prior to the event. If you did not participate, but would like to listen in and enjoy the fellowship, please let me know and I will mail you the link. All welcome!

Our next big event in the life of the church will be our annual meeting to be held via Zoom on or about the date of our February vestry meeting. If you have interest in serving on vestry, or, if you would like to nominate someone, (please ask them first), speak with Father Rick or any vestry member. There are a few requirements for eligibility.

Welcome 2021! The rolling out of the COVID vaccine gives us renewed hope in a better tomorrow. May it be a year of restoration and new beginnings.








- Metal gingerbread man cookie cutter


#### What you do:

- 1. Remove labels and break crayons into 1-inch pieces.
- 2. Scatter pieces on the baking sheet, about two layers thick.
- 3. Bake for 10 minutes at 350 degrees until melted. Allow to cool 15 minutes.
- 4. When melted crayons are the consistency of playdough, press the cookie cutter through them (while still on pan).
- 5. Cool the pan in freezer for 15 minutes until crayons are hardened.



# **Clothing Repairs**



# Gaudete Sunday

The Third Sunday of Advent is sometimes the candle. called "Gaudete Sunday." The name comes from the Latin word "Gaudete", meaning rejoice which is the first word of the Latin introit for the service.

On Gaudete Sunday rose-colored vestments may be worn instead of violet (or instead of deep blue, in some Anglican and Lutheran traditions), which is otherwise prescribed for every day in the season of Advent. Gaudete Sunday was also known as "Rose Sundav".

In churches that have an Advent wreath, the rose-colored candle is lit in addition to two of the violet- or blue-colored candles, which represent the first two Sundays of Advent. . Purple (or blue) is the traditional color for Advent, representing blood and repentance. But on Gaudete Sunday, we take away a little of the penitential tone of the rest of Advent, we "lighten up" for a moment of rejoicing in anticipation of Jesus' arrival. Despite the otherwise somber readings of the season of Advent, which has as a secondary theme the need for penitence, the readings on the third Sunday emphasize the joyous anticipation of the Lord's coming

#### Waiting until God is heard

We're often taught that prayer is speaking to God. And of course, that's part of it. It's good to pray for the well-being and needs of others — even Jesus prayed for his disciples. It's okay to pray for our own growth in faith and love. It's a wonderful, powerful thing, modeled especially by the Psalmists, to give God thanks and praise. And God welcomes our cries of pain and sorrow, offering the Spirit's help when words fail us (Romans 8:26).

But through the ages, many deeply faithful followers of Christ have practiced contemplative prayer, centering prayer and other forms of stillness before God. Danish theologian Søren Kierkegaard (1813-1855) expressed it this way: "To pray does not mean to listen to oneself speaking. Prayer involves becoming silent, and being silent, and waiting until God is heard."


