Invited to address the group gathered as the evening's keynote speaker, it was my honor and privilege to speak at GOAL's 30th Anniversary Celebration of the way addiction and recovery has underpinned my own life's journey, and how instrumental my Christian faith has been in my own healing and thriving, with God's help. I allowed myself to be vulnerable with the group gathered that evening, and I told them how my mother succumbed to serious depression, started using hard drugs, and left my dad and I when I was still a toddler. I shared that my father remarried a wounded woman whose deep pain manifested in an alcoholism that often left me physically bruised, welted and in fear; and that when I was six, my closest aunt was killed in a drunk driving accident; how in the following year, my mother died of a drug overdose. But I also opened up about my own struggles with substance abuse as a young man. I explained how, touring with rock bands in my twenties, I found myself in circles with folks who normalized heavy drinking and the use of recreational drugs; and how, in many ways, I adapted to my environment. My friends started to die. First it was my childhood buddy and first bandmate, loaded and jumping off a bridge in Seattle. Then it was my old drummer in Vegas, my guitarist on the streets of Miami...another three soon thereafter.

Reflecting in my address, I spoke of how I started getting truly sick and tired of being sick and tired all the time; and how in my exhaustion and my resignation, I started to hear the quiet voice of soul from within my and addictions are often symptoms, like the own being again. 

While none of us can truly walk in the shoes of another, I do believe that everyone of us can be redeemed, resurrected through the power of the stories that we tell and that we believe to be true. There was something wonderfully empowering about sharing my own story to model the alleviation of shame and stigma around talking about addiction and recovery. The experience led me to wonder if, perhaps, such a ministry might find fertile soil here at St. Edward's. 



- 4. Create a loop of yarn and tie it to the top of the ornament for hanging.



People often ask, "What exactly is a Stephen Minister?" Stephen Ministers are members of our congregation trained to provide one-to-one, Christ-centered care. They have a compassionate heart for those who are hurting, and they're equipped with caring ministry skills by your congregation's Stephen Leaders, Father Rick and Dina Ishler A Stephen Minister typically has one care receiver at a time and meets with that person once a week to listen, ... after the gavel comes down, the handcare, pray, encourage, and offer emotional cuffs go on, and your loved one is led and spiritual support.

Another way to put it is that Stephen Ministers "After are the People".

Stephen Ministers are there:

. . after the phone call you hoped you'd never get.

. . . after the funeral, when evervone has left and the emotions you've held at bay come crashing in on

We are caregivers, not cure givers. We know and trust that our God is the ultimate healer.





A Mother's Struggle - God's Faithfulness

I have said many times that I know that "inner voice" and I pay attention to it. I call that voice Holy Spirit. I would like to share a story. After 20 years of being drug free, in 2014 my son relapsed big time at the age of 40. We had an incident that resulted in him saying he never wants to see or speak to me again in this lifetime and he was true his word.

For four years I didn't know where he was But missing him was so intense. It had or how he was. I just knew he was caught up in addiction. This is NOT how I expected my mischievous, funny and lovable little boy's life to turn out. I struggled with worry and trying to release him into God's hands. And then God gave me this verse to hold on to. It is Exodus 14:13-14. Moses was talking to the Israelites but it was also God speaking to me. It said, "Stand firm. Don't fear. The Lord will fight for you. You have only to be still." Not long after, I had found out my son was homeless and living in his car. Everything within me wanted to protect him and bring him home. Everything within me knew I couldn't. He had to learn the lessons that were in this journey he had taken. I had to keep learning the lesson of "letting go and trusting God." So, "Stand Firm, Don't Fear, Be Still, Let God do the fighting for you" became my mantra.

Like many others, Christmas is not a particularly happy time...apart from Jesus....because we have lost so many or our families are broken. In 2017, I was missing Mike terriblyand I was crying out to God...will you please help me, I can hardly handle this? And he did. For one solid week that verse or something similar showed up in one form or another. I have it recorded in a journal. Now I share it with you.

Dec. 09, 2017 - I received a phone call from a friend informing me where Mike is living and she gave me his address. I was so relieved. I bought a Christmas card, an Amazon gift card, wrote a letter and was going to mail it but had a check in my spirit. Went to Bible Study and bounced it off Trust God." the women. I received feedback but the Dec. 17, 2017 – On Facebook. "You're one that resonated was, "I don't think you should do anything!" That's not what I wanted to hear but I knew it was right. battle." -God So...I went back to my verse and keep standing in trust.

Then another thought came, (Yes, I believe God speaks through our thoughts). "The pain of having him back in your life, may be more painful than this separation.' "Okay, God. I hear you."

Dec. 11, 2017 – I went to Meditation at St. James. We spent the entire time chanting. Guess what the words were? "Don't be afraid. Take heart. Be still." Sound familiar? Only the "take heart" was different but it gave me hope.

been four long years and I kept vacillating. As you will see, God was patient with me.

Dec. 12, 2017 - My thought. Maybe I could just ask Dawn to text him on Christmas and say, "Your mom says she loves you and misses you."

Dec. 13, 2017 - I was reading Richard Rohr's daily email meditation. At the very end of the reading it said, "Let it go, Let it be!!! "Okay God. I hear you."

Dec. 14, 2017 – I decided to buy a picture of Jesus holding a lamb so I could look at it and visualize Mike in his arms. It would help me trust. I found two that I liked on Amazon and couldn't decide so left them in my shopping cart. That night, before bed, I was listening to music on YouTube. I clicked on a song and right before my eyes is the exact picture in my Amazon shopping cart. I said, "Thank you, God. I know you are here."

Dec. 15, 2017 – The day's reading was from Psalm 119. "You are blessed when you stay on course. Walk steadily on the path God revealed." "I hear you, God. I'm going to keep doing what you told me. Stand firm, don't fear, trust you with my son and be still. Don't ever walk off and leave me thought, God. (As if he would!) I need you. This is so tough."


Dec. 16. 2017 - On Facebook. A Peanuts cartoon shows up in my feed.

That was my last message.



Feb. 2018 – I wrote in my journal, "Give God the glory, Joyce. He was faithful, he got you through the Christmas season. He has told you in so many ways, "I've got this, Joyce." Now continue to be obedient and let it alone. If he's to come back to the family, it will happen in God's time. Just never stop praying.'

I finally deleted the letter from my computer that I had wanted to send him with the Christmas card.

Mar. 2018 - Book of Common Prayer -"Be not disturbed by memories that come unbidden. Swiftly forgive and let Christ speak for you unspoken words. Unfinished conversation will be resolved in him. Be not disturbed."

So, this verse tells me to let Christ speak the unspoken words I may never get to say? That speaks of "Trust".

The LORD is my strength and shield. I trust him with all my heart. He helps me, and my heart is filled with joy. (Psalm 28:7, NLT)

Aug. 2018 – I was sitting in my office at St. James and I received a phone call telling me that Mike had been arrested and was facing up to 10 years in prison. I was stunned. All I could think was, "I never thought anything like this would happen. In ten years I will be in my 80's. I might not be alive." So I wanted to write a letter and leave it with my Will, telling him how much I loved him and why I needed to make the decision I did. I walked across the hall to Father Rick's office. I didn't know him very well, but I said something like, "May I talk to you. I need some help?" I explained the whole situation and he response was, "I think you need to send that letter now." That had never occurred to me. I was so resigned to the fact that I would never see Mike again and I had to trust him to God. Father Rick's father had just passed and he talked about how important closure is. So with some wise

words that I picked up from our conversation. I wrote that letter and mailed it. What happened?? Mike responded! After four long years, I had my son back. Our relationship has been restored. Thank you, Father Rick, for your shepherd's heart. I'm so glad you were there that day and will be forever grateful.. "Thank you, God. You are so beyond our comprehension, mysterious, awe-inspiring Creator of all things, and yet you also reveal yourself as personal. You say you shelter us under your wings, you lead us beside the still waters, you restore our souls, you are our shepherd, you even know the very number of hairs on our head and you love us with an everlasting love. You are also one on whom we can cast our cares and you respond so intimately. I am humbled.'

Mike was sentenced to three years, not ten. "Thank you, God." He has 14 months to go. So I'm still in a waiting pattern. By the time he is released, I will have waited seven long years to actually have some quality time with him. I am so looking forward to that day. In the meantime, we email each other.

I would like to ask you to send Christmas cards to him to brighten his Christmas and let him know he is not alone.....also to keep him and his future in your prayers.

Mike's name is Gerald Michael. We have always called him Mike. The address has to be exactly as shown but cards inside can be addressed to Mike.





Last year, Israeli scientists harvested dates from seeds that had been dormant about 2,000 years. The seeds, recovered during archaeological digs, were nurtured in incubators and several thrived. One (named Methuselah!) became a 10-foot-tall palm tree.

Horticulturists joked about marketing "dates that Jesus ate," but there's another scriptural connection. Isaiah 11, a traditional Advent reading, prophesies: "A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots" (verse 1, NRSV). Jesus is the tender shoot that emerged from the humble peasant origins of Jesse, father of King David. From a dynasty that went dormant due to Israel's sins sprouted a mighty tree, who will someday usher in a reign of peace (see verses 6-7). —adapted
