

tif of 'Transfiguration' as a gateway for redeeming the macabre story of El Salvador's violent history. Recounting sermons offered up by Romero throughout his ministry, the author explores the transformation of Romero himself as he came to comprehend, more deeply, the ways in which the salvation of his nation and its people were linked to the Transfiguration of its history. Softened by a heightened sensitivity to the suffering of his people, Romero's vision of Transfiguration came to take on a revolutionary undertone through which he asked: "By what right have we catalogued people into first-class humans and second-class humans when in the theology of the human there is only one class, that of children of God?" (Homilias, 6:346). At the heart of this sense of Gospel, one centrally significant exegetical dimension that Colon-Emeric lifts out of surfaces from his consideration that all the figures present with Jesus (both past and present) upon Mount Tabor, were themselves linked to histories of violence or pronouncedly aggressive temperament. Noting that: as Moses killed an Egyptian and Elijah ordered the slaving of the prophets of Baal, Peter drew his sword at Gethsemane and the 'Sons of Thunmaritans' refusal to extend hospitality to Jesus and the disciples. Through such Transfiguration in the lives of disciples, Oscar Romero famously envisioned the aggression inherent to human creatures recast in "the violence of love." As Romero declared: "We have never preached violence, only the violence of love; the violence that left Christ nailed to a cross, the violence that one does to oneself to overcome one's selfishness so that there may not be such cruel inequalities among us. That violence is not the violence of the sword or of hatred, it is the violence of love, of fraternity, that wants to turn weapons into pruning hooks for work" (Homilias, 2:36).

Working from out of a culture of death-Romero's preaching on the Transfiguration dealing, Romero envisioned the Holy potential for a transfigured people to rechannel animal aggressions in the direction of Christian discipleship. As Colon-Emeric writes: "Tabor was a school for the civilization of love. - Fasten the lid. Then shake and turn the bottle to "spy" each item.





This large, white candle is an ancient symbol for Christ, the light of the world. The candle contains a cross and/or an Alpha and Omega to symbolize that Jesus is eternal and always present with his people. Also called the Easter candle, it plays a prominent role during Easter vigils and celebrations. Some churches also use the candle during baptisms and funerals.

This month I would like to share a story about Malalay's mother, Toorpekay. Because her picture was in the news around the world following this event I am going to share with you, her picture is not a threat and Malalay wanted it included.

Toorpekay operated a Midwife Training Centre for young women in Jalalabad. She had 60+ students at the school. Because of fear for the safety of the young women, Malalay's mother built a safe room on the third floor of the school and installed an alarm on the first floor so they could be alerted in the event of an attack. In 2018, what they feared happened.

Afghanistan: Gunmen kill and wound staff at midwife training centre

Militants attack midwife training center. The attackers set off explosives and gunshots at the centre in Jalalabad.

They placed explosive devices in the street near the complex according to eyewitnesses.

Afghan security forces regained control after a gunfight lasting six hours. (Fortunately, all the young women reached the safe room in time so none were harmed. It was later discovered the Centre was being observed for several months from across the street, before the attack finally happened.)

The Taliban denied any involvement. In total, 61 midwives and two children were rescued from the compound. However, two guards and one driver were killed in the attack, while three members of the security forces, three civilians and two Centre employees were hurt.

The Centre offers two-year midwifery training courses for women from the province. More than 50% of births in Afghanistan take place without a trained midwife.

It is not clear why the midwife training Centre was attacked. However, militants often choose official buildings and medical facilities for their attacks,. Many Afghans are opposed to unmarried women working outside their homes. Unfortunately, Malalay's mother had to shut down the Training Centre in 2018.

She is currently providing a home for her three grandchildren (the Rahim's three children) and other family members. Please pray for strength to endure. It is with the blessing of technology that they are able to Facetime every day....the one consolation in their sadness. Her greatest desire is also to come to America some day. **Stay tuned**....I hope to have an article written by Dr. Rahim next month.

On a more positive note, meet Anfal, the youngest Rahim who will be three in June.

Congratulations Dr. Rahim!!!!



We need more help!





Slowing Down Time

A lot has changed since the electric clock was invented in the 1840s. We now keep time on smart watches, smart phones, and laptops. The entire pace of life seems faster -with even our "leisurely" walking speeding up. This is especially true in cities and can have a negative effect on health scholars say. "We are just moving faster and faster and getting back to people as quickly as we can. Professor Richard Wiseman observed. "That is driving us to think everything has to happen now."

Moses, the writer of-one-of-the oldest of the Bible's psalms, reflected on time. He reminds us that God controls life's pace. "A thousand years in your sight are like a day that has just gone by, or like a watch in the night," he wrote (PSALM 90:4).

The secret to time management therefore, isn't to go faster or slower. It's to abide in God, spending more time with Him. Then we get in step with each other, but first with Him-the One who formed us (139:13) and knows our purpose and plans (V. 16).

Our time on earth won't last forever. Yet we can manage it wisely, not by watching the clock but by giving each day to God. As Moses said, "Teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom" (90:12). Then, with God we'll always be on time, now and forever.




