and the start of Lent and when I returned to the work, the writing and recording morphed into a tactile expression of my own Lenten discipline. The songs became like onions, whose layers I peeled away to peer with increased depth and sincerity into my inner-most longings, into the things that I knew needed letting go of, in my mind and heart. Songs like "The Myth of Sisyphus" and "Firewood" took shape to help me express a sober awareness of just how much work I still have to do to become the person that I truly hope to be in Christ. I wrestled with feelings of futility, loneliness, anger, and heartbreak as I lived into the Lenten metaphor of 'a journey toward the cross' and allowed myself to express, and process, raw emotions in the exercise of naming and releasing them.



He had to take a phone call and stepped outside while I strolled around the

700 sq. ft. layout. My old bedroom was now occupied by a little girl, who slept in a small bed inside of a teepee next to a giant stuffed Baby Yoda. I took a knee, placed the small wooden cross that I carry everywhere upon the wood laminate floor, and I blessed the room.

I had cried many times in that room, mourning the deaths of my mother, stepmother, father, grandmother, aunts, uncles, and friends. I had experienced the flutter of first love in that room, written my first songs there, spent my final night between its walls when the time came to hand over the keys to the new owner. And in that room, in that moment, invoking a priestly blessing on a space that used to be mine, for a new child, I sensed that I had completed the cycle of my Lenten "letting go" in middle-age. It was fitting to spend the remainder of my time back home visiting old friends and remembering who I'd been and where I'd come from, and it seemed perfectly appropriate to claim (in a retrain for the Episcopal Priesthood and I live into my vocation through serving in this vibrant and loving community that we share together. Greetings, friends from your vestry! We kicked off our new vestry year at our April 3 meeting by welcoming new vestry members, Joyce Kamm, Mary Snyder, and Dick Irons.

Father Rick presented his monthly Rector's report, specifically laying out 3 short term goals for our church as we proceed through the year. First will be a major upgrade to the church website, a project that will be an intensive project for our administrator, Michelle, extending into the summer months. This will allow integration of our YouTube page offerings, archiving important documents and sermons, explore a possible new video blog, and will provide interactive messaging so viewers will be able to more easily donate to the

church. Specific increased website attention will be given to our extensive charitable work lead by our most excellent Faith in Action Committee, including our sponsorship of the Rahim family from Afghanistan, the Soles for Souls shoe donation drive, and our support for the Landisville Food Pantry, to name a few.

Secondly, will be the launching of a program for planned giving and endowment seeding for the parish, scheduled for after our new stained glass windows are installed in June.

Thirdly, will be the relaunch for community events as we exit the pandemic, including community meals and the cultural events series which was so successful in the past.

Rick+ joyfully reported the success of Beth Lynch's Wednesday night Camp Pokémon which is attended by 10-17 young people each week, and although it is not a traditional church youth group program, it is an example of how thinking outside of the box is so valuable in showing our church family to the wider community.

Also at our meeting, Beth Lynch agreed at out meeting to serve as our secretary, and we will select a Junior Warden at our next meeting.

The vestry unanimously endorsed the recommendation of member and occasional preacher Wanda Stoltzfus' discernment committee that she proceed with pursuing the process towards becoming a deacon, and our church will

provide \$750 to support her clinical pastoral education at the Stevenson School for Ministry.

The financial committee report was reviewed, and we are slightly ahead, at present, of the very conservative 2022 budget as of the end of March.

Michelle reported that she is planning with our Property Chair, Mike Freshwater, a spring clean-up day to include both indoor and outdoor projects tentatively scheduled for May 14. Stay tuned for details and volunteer opportunities! She has coordinated some minor plumbing repairs this month among her other duties.

We continue our "buddy system" where members volunteer to call and keep tabs on our homebound parishioners and folks still watching our service online because of the pandemic. Call Michelle if you would like to be part of this vital ministry.

It is an exciting time to be part of St. Edward's, and as always, the vestry appreciates your prayerful support!




- Clean cardboard egg carton

- 6. Present the gift to your mom or a special woman in your life.









individuals to wear so they can continue working and providing footwear to walk to the market, work, or school.



We are thrilled to relay that we collected 368 pairs of shoes!!!

Altogether 1372 shoes were shipped. Bev Achey sized, packed and delivered our shoes to St. John's.

The Rahim family has their 240 day marker of Match Grant at 7/29/22. At that time the official commitment of the Welcome Team with CWS will be over. Of course, we heavily encourage, and hope for, continued relationships with the family going forward. That will look different for each person on the team based on their level of connection they were able to make with the family. By that time the family should be able to live their lives in a self-sufficient way, so they don't rely on the Welcome Team any longer to provide goods or services, but are seen more as friends. This will also look different per family because the level of independence may vary.

7/29 is only three months away. It feels very strange to read these words.

"The official role of the Welcome Team with CWS will come to an end."

Because the Rahims have become like family and we are actively involved with a Legal Immigration Lawyer to, with great hope, bring their remaining children to the United States, our commitment as a community will not end. We are keenly aware that COVID has made it impossible for you, the congregation, to meet this family that you have supported and continue to support so lovingly. There are upcoming plans to have a "meet and greet" dinner for the whole congregation so you can finally meet the Rahims. A date has not yet been determined so please stay tuned.

Our Welcome Team kept growing over the last three months as more and more activities were added, specifically tutoring, soccer and track. Khateeb and Soahib are thriving in the world of sports. Tayab is more laid back and takes his time with decisions. He's still waiting to find his niche but I think soccer may be in his future as well.








When Ida Nelson, head tribal clerk of a remote Alaskan village, heard an airplane flying low after dark, she knew something was wrong. Igiugig (Igggy-yawgigg), population 70, isn't normally a nighttime destination. Indeed, the medevac flight was coming to pick up a sick child.

Because the local airstrip's lights had been vandalized, the plane was having trouble landing. Nelson began alerting neighbors, and within minutes, villagers lined the runway with their vehicles, headlights blazing. The pilot was able to land and then safely deliver the sick child to an Anchorage hospital. The airlift service praised the residents' determination, but Nelson describes their effort as "normal" and "ordinary."


Worship the Lord in the beauty of Holiness!


We need more help!
