

know all too well that human relationships are tough. But it may shift (and expand) our thinking to consider that God's love for the world, and for each of us, could be just as risky as the emotional chances that we ourselves take in relationships with others. Could it be that our choices have the capacity to wound God as we exercise the freedom that we each possess? Do we ever pause to think about what Jesus, in his humanity, might have felt as he was rejected, beaten, and handed over to death by his own people? Part of what speaks to me about Ilia Delio's take on love, is that it invites me to think about handing over and accepting things that cannot be controlled, dominated, and manipulated... like the love we hold and extend to other people. She invites me to wonder about how we get to the purity of heart that reflects Christ's own love, a place that wants for the fullness and healing of those who hurt us.

I had discovered Delio's work, and become a fan, while engaging research for my doctoral writing on the ways that we comprehend the Divine through the natural world and a posture of inward silence. Like my favorite theologian, the late Jesuit priest and paleontolo-

gist Pierre Teilhard de Chardin, Delio contends that evolution drives the enterprise of Creation and witnesses to Christ through the myriad ways that nature strives toward more life in a still-becoming and an everexpanding direction. That may sound like a mouthful, but I think these wonderful thinkers simply invite us to pay attention to the world around us and to learn how to see God there, to understand what God is like through what's revealed every day in the rhythms and the changes of our natural world. Embracing such insight, I do my best to pay attention to what the streams and the trees around have to say to me. And I've found this to be particularly helpful as literal and figurative seasons change. So, what might the colors and the cooling winds of Autumn have to whisper to us about the stuff of love?

I slipped away for an overnight retreat on a day off to "pay attention" to this question, deep within the forests of George Washington National Park in Virginia. Without another human being in sight, I took a long hike through a multi-colored carpet of crunchy, fallen leaves. Cold and wisping winds that swirled around me pulled down shades of dying reds and browns, yellows, and oranges, from the thousands of trees that blanketed all I could see in every direction. A couple of hours into the walk, a little tired, I stopped in my tracks and realized that almost all the sounds that I had been hearing were coming from me. The dead leaves crunching underneath my feet had been like a rude dinner guest chewing with an open mouth at table with the silence and stillness of the forest. I had been dominating the conversation, where in the chatter of my head, nature hadn't been able to get a word in edgewise. And so, I won-

that walk...making noise, trampling, interrupting the silence.

A bit later, feeling bold in my assurance that no one could see or hear me, I decided to talk, out loud, to God. I decided to verbally request a "sign" from the Divine, asking for an audible or a visual verification of (his/her/its) presence. I stopped in my tracks once again, to quiet the cacophony of chomping hard cereal under my feet. I waited for a while. I listened for the song of a bird, the thrust of a wind. I looked for a buck to appear through the trees or a snake to slither near my feet. But the only thing that I saw or heard, was the falling of the leaves, colorful and dead. Two things descended upon my heart and mind in that moment. Firstly, that the language of God Rick+ silence: ambiguous, spacious, and watchful silence. The second, that a God of love revealed in nature is one that bears witness to change. The disrobing trees in that forest had been at their annual ritual since time immemorial. They've stood in silent witness, almost invisible in their collective, as tactile expressions of the way it is. It's so obvious and apparent, so everpresent and all around us, that we can easily miss it.

I think that we're all like trees. We each have our seasons and the changes in colors that come with them. And I think that experiencing love isn't unlike standing in a vast forest and watching nature's majestic unfolding with absolutely no power to manipulate or control the spectacle. All that any of us can do is appreciate our moments of presence to it and learn how to accept the changes as they come. But I also think that we forget to pay attention, that even when we set aside time to listen and to watch, the noise of our stomping through crunching leaves can easily swallow the

dered how much of my life was just like silence and the simplicity of God's revelations in nature, of God's revelations in love. Yes, love is free, as free as falling leaves. And yes, the stuff of Cross and the Resurrection reveals itself across God's Creations with the highest level of intelligibility for any who have eyes to see the death and the rebirth that dance in all seasons. Season changes can sting, like cold and crisp winds that strike us unprepared. But they come nonetheless, and we might as well celebrate the freedom of the shifting wind, like love. There is always beauty in sorrow and sorrow in beauty. But it's such a gift to be alive, to watch and to experience it all on display: before, around, and within us. God is everywhere, and God is love.





Annual Jesse Tree Project Set to Begin

The Jesse Tree "A shoot will spring forth from the stump of Jesse, and a branch out of his roots." Baidh 11:1

For many, Thanksgiving and Christmas represents a 'season of giving'. Giving to the foster children of COBYs during the holidays has been a long-time favorite of this parish.

This service is known as the Jesse Tree project.

The Jesse Tree is a unique Advent custom and the tradition traces back as far as the Middle Ages.

The earliest Jesse Trees were made of tapestries, carvings, and stained glass. These visual displays allowed uneducated people who could not read or write to learn about the

Scriptures from the time of Creation until the birth of Jesus.

What Is a Jesse Tree?

The word advent means "arrival." Because Advent is a time to anticipate and prepare for the arrival of Christ at Christmas. The Jesse Tree represents the family tree, or genealogy, of Jesus Christ. It tells the story of God's salvation plan, beginning with creation and continuing through the Old Testament, to the coming of the Messiah.

The name "Jesse Tree" comes from Isaiah 11:1. "Then a shoot will spring from the stem of Jesse, and a branch from his roots will bear fruit." (NASB) The verse refers to King David's father, Jesse, who is in the lineage of Jesus Christ. The "shoot" that grew from the "stem of Jesse," that is, the royal line of David, is Jesus Christ.

Within your own family, you can make and add ornaments to a tree that represent the story of Jesus.

The St. Edward's Jesse Tree

The St. Edward's Jesse Tree provides a peaceful spot under its branch for gifts that will be given to children in foster care to make Christmas a little brighter. Through COBYS Family Services we obtain a list of children in foster care, their ages, and their Christmas wishes. We don't take the place of Santa. Rather, we act as Santa's helpers by adding another gift or two for a child to open on Christmas morning.

How Can You Participate?

First, you have two options: buy gifts for a child or make a monetary donation that will be used to purchase gifts. (Suggested amount to spend or donate: \$40 -\$50 per child)

You will note your option when you complete a sign-up form and deposit in the box in the church or complete the online form (*Link is available through Leslie Arnold or in the church's weekly emails form Michelle.*)

Next, you will give a check to Michelle, if you are donating, or you will receive a "child assignment" with a wish list included from the Jesse Tree committee.

If you are buying gifts for a specific child, you will bring your wrapped gifts to the church and place under our Jesse Tree by an assigned date.

When will this happen?

Signup forms will be available beginning October 30. A downloadable form should also be on our website at that time.

Signup forms or monetary donations will be due November 13

Parishioners who are opting to shop for a child will receive the name(s) of child and the "wish lists" by November 21 (to be placed in your parish mailbox)

Wrapped gifts will be due December 6


Lunch and Learn

me to formulate my direction forward, when the road ahead seemed dark and full of despair. The questions they asked illuminated my path but didn't direct it.






First Sunday of Advent, November 27

The journey begins at Advent

When Advent begins on November 27 this year, so does a new church year for liturgical congregations. The church seasons, which correspond to key events in Jesus' life, begin with the four-week Advent period of preparation for our coming Savior at Christmas. After the 12-day season of Christmas is Epiphany, which begins January 6 and continues through Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. That period of preparation culminates in Holy Week, and then Easter marks the pinnacle of every church year. Forty days after the Resurrection we celebrate Ascension, and 10 days after that, the Pentecost season begins; it lasts until Advent, when the cycle begins again.

"Like a great waterwheel," writes Joan Chittister, "the liturgical year goes on relentlessly irrigating our souls, softening the ground of our hearts, nourishing the soil of our lives until the seed of the Word of God itself begins to grow in us, comes to fruit in us, ripens in us the spiritual journey of a lifetime."





- 3. If donating money please mark your check note "turkey 2022."



Did You Know?

"The United States is called the Incarcera-"Bringing hope and encouragement to tion Nation. We have 25% of the world's prison population despite having only 5% of the world's overall population.

> According to Google, the cost of incarceration is \$31,000 a year per prisoner. There is a better way!

> Sentencing laws need to change to make alternatives to prison the default penalty for certain lower-level crimes like drug possession, petty theft, or selling marijuana. Consider instead Probation (10 times cheaper than incarceration), Mental Health Treatment, Drug and Alcohol Treatment or Community Service as some alternatives. I invite you to find ways to get involved in prison reform.

Learn About The Lancaster County Bail Fund

The Lancaster Bail Fund creates an option for people who would otherwise languish indefinitely in the Lancaster County Prison due to an inability to pay their bail. Remember, we are innocent until proven guilty. On an average day, anywhere from 60-75% of the people in our county jail are not serving sentences. They are being detained pretrial, many because they cannot post bail. This puts them at risk of losing their job, their home, their family.

The Bail Fund posts the full amount of an accused person's bail. Then, when their case is closed, the bail money is returned by the court, paid back into the Bail Fund, and recycled to help additional people. The same donation can be used repeatedly, creating an impactful force multiplier. By completing an online form or making a phone call to the Bail Fund, bail can be posted as soon as the same day.
