I found myself deeply inspired by our Holy Week observances and allowed myself to lean further into my own sense of worship and vocation, into my personal experience of God in Christ. And so it was, that I left for a vacation after Easter with a strong sense of connection to our shared mission and vision here at St. Edward's, feeling called to spend my time away in some of the holy places that continue to call pilgrims, the world over, to marvel at the inspirational power of our Christian faith to manifest brilliant works of art and architecture. Traveling to Rome, I booked a hotel room in view of Vatican City and the dome of St. Peter's Basilica. And there, I knelt in prayer before the ashes of St. Peter, revisited the Sistine Chapel and Michelangelo's Pieta, posed for a picture in front of my favorite painting by Vincent Van Gogh, and wandered the rooms of the Vatican Museum covered in the incomparably brilliant frescos of Raphael. In Rome, I explored the depths of my own walk with the Cross and the Resurrection and found pro-

found beauty and power in even unexpected places.

For the first time, I visited the Capuchin Museum and its famed crypt where the exhumed remains of 4,000 friars are on display, blending the beautiful and the macabre in an awe-inspiring juxtaposition. From skeletal remains fashioned into chandeliers to mummified bodies standing like mannequins in still-life, the Capuchin Crypt introduced me to the monks' own, Ash Wednesday-like mantra: "what you are now we used to be; what we are now you will be...". The place humbled me to my core; and in the hopes of always recalling the experience, I came home with a small print of a hidden Capuchin treasure: Caravaggio's painting of St. Francis with a skull. It now hangs on the wall in our Rector's Study.

While I had been to Rome before as a young man, I then decided to visit a place on my "bucket list" that I hadn't been to yet...Athens! But what I couldn't have imagined, is that I was about to have one of the most profound religious experiences of my life there. Something incredibly obvious to a person in my line of work hadn't occurred to me, in that our Eastern Orthodox sisters and brothers still use the Julian calendar to determine the date of Easter, placing me in the heart of Greece on Good Friday. Furthermore, I hadn't realized that the hotel I had booked was, quite literally, next door to the very seat of the Archbishopric of Athens and all of Greece, the Metropolitan Cathedral of the Annunciation. Thus, despite my lack of awareness, I was placed in the center of the Eastern church's observance of the most solemn day of the year. Despite myself, the Holy Spirit seemed to be guiding my itinerary.

As thousands upon thousands of Greeks couldn't have imagined that I would find descended upon the area, gathering outside the exact spot where the lantern was of the cathedral where the head of the nation's church leads worship, I proceeded to the doors of the sanctuary and was welcomed to stand in the back for the Good Friday liturgy. After being censed and blessed with holy water and rose petals by the archbishop of the nation, I became entranced by two hours of chanting and prayer beside an ornate canopy of flowers. This structure called the Easter Epitaph, representing the symbolic funeral bier of Jesus Christ, and it's Orthodox custom to process through the city streets behind the canopy as a liturgical participation in the actual funeral of Jesus every year. With the city's streets closed off, I walked along with the people of Athens behind the giant Epitaph to the city square, where gathered with heads of state and military generals, our Lord was laid to rest with the full gravitas and ceremony of a beloved king's funeral. At that moment, it was the most beautiful liturgy that I had ever been a part of.

brought, but the Spirit led me to the time and space that allowed me to participate in the unveiling of the Holy Fire, where I was then able to light candles for the people of Athens from my own, spreading the same flame that began inside the tomb of our Lord in Jerusalem just hours before. For the second time in two days, it was the most impactful liturgy that I had ever been a part of.

I kept my candle lit as I made my way back to the hotel from the procession that night, watching the flame as it flickered in my room against the window facing the Cathedral. Knowing that I would have to blow out the flame before falling asleep, I felt like I was doing something wrong...as if it was a "sin" of the highest order to willfully extinguish this bit of light from the Holy Fire. But then it dawned on me: that every candle lit from my own, that every flame burning throughout the streets Athens, assured that the Holy Fire would continue to give light to the world. 


Lunch and Learn

Pysanky Eggs



Carol Carey brought these Ukrainian Easter Eggs (Pysanky Eggs) to a Widows' group. She showed them to Fr. Rick and said at her old church they were used on the Altar at Easter. Fr. Rick added them to our Altar as a way to remember the people of Ukraine.

Pysanky eggs are Ukrainian Easter eggs decorated with complex floral and geometric designs. The name pysanka comes from the Ukrainian verb pasty, which means "to write". The tradition of decorating eggs dates back to the pre -Christian era and relied on a waxresist technique known as batik. The eggs were believed to contain great powers and were considered a talisman against evil. The tradition was absorbed into the Christian celebration of Christ's resurrection. The practice was banned in Ukraine by the Soviet regime, but saw a resurgence after independence in 1991.

The column to the right shows the process for creating the eggs. Using the stylus to paint the design with melted wax, first draw a design on the egg. Using the melted wax, start by covering what you want to stay white in the final design, then dye the egg a light color, such as yellow. Using the melted wax cover the part of the design you want to remain yellow. Dye the egg a slightly darker color. Repeat these steps until finally you dye the egg a dark color, then remove the wax to see the finished design.

Above and to the left are some of my collection of eggs. I made some of them. I used to show my classes how to make them. The original ones still have the egg inside. Newer ones are hollow. My Russian tutor, who is Ukrainian, said the eggs are still made at Easter and are brought to church with bread to be blessed for the traditional Easter meal.







Support for Prison Ministries, with offices in Brownstown, PA, is a growing interdenominational ministry that contracts chaplain services to Lancaster County Prison (LCP) and Lancaster County Youth Intervention Center (YIC). SFPM also does training and educational programs for local churches and community groups.

How You Can Help:

Praise Item - as Spring comes forth in its beauty, it is a reminder that barrenness can be restored. In prison settings many individuals' Spiritual lives were barren, but when hearing the good news of Jesus Christ, they have come forth in the Spiritual beauty of a new life in Christ.

Pray for an officer who is trying to be the best father he can be but also allow himself to take some self-care time.

Continue to pray for Emily Sensenig, daughter of SFPM Administrative Assistant Jewel, as she battles cancer. She is waiting for a bone marrow transplant, hopefully by June.

Pray for an inmate whose family is praying that he hits rock bottom here in prison and turns his life over to Jesus. Pray for peace for the family.

Pray for a SFPM board member's wife - who was diagnosed with cancer. Pray for the family as they deal with this challenge.

Pray for an inmate who is angry and takes it out on everyone around her. Pray that God will soften her heart and show her how much he loves her.

Pray for a released female inmate - who has mental health challenges and has not been taking her medicine since release and is falling back. Pray those around her could convince her she needs the medication to live productively.

Ramadan With The Rahims

With Input From The Rahims

Ramadan starts the 9th month in the Islamic lunar calendar. The start date is dependent on when the new moon is visible. Muslims believe that this is the month in which God revealed the first verses of the Quran to Muhammad, who is considered the final prophet of Islam. So for 30 days, Muslims abstain from sex, food, drinking (even water), and smoking from dusk to dawn. During this time period they take time for spiritual reflection, prayer, doing good deeds, spend time with family and friends, consider their shortcomings in their relationships with others, enabling them to strengthen their bond with the rest of humanity for the sake of Allah. The elderly and sick are exempt from fasting as are girls till age 13 and boys till age 14.

If someone breaks their fast *intentionally*, they have to get it back. Rather than 30 days, they have to fast for 60 days and feed 60 people under the imposition of penalties. Malalay says "This is part of our religion. That's why people have to be careful about it."

During Ramadan there are two meals. The first is Suhur (just before dawn) after which Najib is required to go to the mosque and pray and the second is called Iftar, when the fast is broken at sundown. They break the fast with dates and milk, followed by a meal.

The night is for worship. The Rahims said it is worse at night because they don't get a lot of sleep. They wake before midnight for prayers (if they have even gone to bed before then) and wake again at 4:30 to start their day with breakfast (suhur) before the fasting begins. I don't know if Najib does this but many will gather after nightfall in the mosque for a special communal night prayer called the Tarawih. This is in addition to the five daily prayers that are part of the core of Islam. In the morning, sleeping longer than needed and missing your prayers is not permissible. Najib said they believe the more they pray, the more rewards they will receive. (The biggest reward they can receive, in my opinion, is to see those three children on a plane to the U.S.).

Giving thanks to God is core, which is why Muslims break the fast with a threeday holiday called Eid at Fitr ("Festival of breaking fast") in the 10th month of their calendar. Muslims all over the world greet each other with the phrase Eid Mubarak which means "Blessed feast/festival".

There is a lot of shopping in preparation for Eid. Women decorate the house for

this special occasion. Money is given as a gift to the children which makes them very happy. The night before Eid, women usually get henna tattoos on their hands. It is believed to bring good luck and an unseen flow of positive energy that will bring blessings and protect against evil spirits. It is also because their religion encourages women to beautify themselves and look good at celebrations.

Even in the time of Prophet Muhammad, women used it on nails and palms.



A biographical history of the

Swarr family.

The founder of the family in this country was Peter Schwahr, now Swarr, a native of Alsace province, and was born Anno Domini, 1690, near the city of Strasburg. He married a lady, who was a native of the David is the present owner. city of Strasburg, whose maiden name was Adaline Blooming.. They had two sons, Peter and Christian. In the year 1715, he with his family, emigrated to this country and arrived in Philadelphia in the Spring of 1716, as found by colonial records. He left France on account of the persecutions waged against the Protestants, himself and family being Hugenots. Soon after their arrival at Philadelphia, they left for the interior and arrived, at what is now Lancaster City, in the same spring of 1716 and went about one and one-half miles farther west where they made their abode, and took a meal under an oak tree (as I heard related when I was a boy). Here Peter men whom he got out of the barracks at Swarr got in the possession in common, with Hans and Jacob Brubaker, of 1000 acres of land which they divided, Swarr taking the most northerly part of it, which

was along the King's High-way, now the Harrisburg Pike. The stone arch bridge on the pike adjacent to what is now Long's Park, was for many years known as Swarr's Bridge. On the north side of the east wing wall, there is a stone built in, that was blood stained before the wall was https://www.forgottenbooks.com/en/books/ABi made, there having been a peddler murdered, by which the stone was stained. Swarr's farm on the south side of the pike (now Harnish's) still contains buildings put up by Swarr. There was one of the sons killed by a cross bull in the meadow of that farm. The spot was marked with a stone as I was told by Jacob Harnish, who was also raised on the farm; his brother

> Soon after the founder, Peter Swarr had settled here, he got into the possession of 1000 acres of land, four and one half miles northwest of Lancaster City, now East Hempfield township, where he built a grist and sawmill. On Swarr's run, where he built an aqueduct about a mile long, in order to get rise and fall for a 14 foot overshot water wheel, one of the sons, during the Revolution, put up in place a large three story brick mill by which a post office was named Swarr's Mill Post Office. The mechanics employed by Swarr were Hessian prisoners, who were skilled work-Lancaster.




