Indeed, in the great spirit of the "BOTH/ AND", we're quite beholden to the canons and the structures of the Episcopal Church, supremely interested in how we're governed from above. And so: this relationship expresses the imperative of our involvement in matters beyond our campus, the importance of keeping ourselves aware of the changes in our midst. So, what IS going on at the diocesan level?

Having split into two distinct bodies more than a hundred years ago (due to rapid growth in membership and expansion throughout our denomination) the sister communities that make up the Episcopal Church in Central Pennsylvania and the Diocese of Bethlehem have now found ourselves sharing a narrative of decline. Though St. Edward's is part of a handful of churches where more than a hundred folks gather for worship every week, most of our parishes are shrinking at a dramatic and an alarming pace. Rounding the numbers: our diocese reports that we currently have just over 9,500 active baptized members spread out over 60 parishes here in Central Penn-

For while the history of the Episcopal Church in our area goes back to the American Revolution, it now faces an uncertain future, in the sobering acknowledgement that only .5% of adults in America now identify as Episcopalian. Yes, a mere one-half of one percent of people in the United States share our stated beliefs about metaphysical reality, common prayer, and the claim to apostolic authority of our bishops. This means that if any one of us were standing in a crowd of a thousand people, equally distributed among national demographics, we could anticipate that only four other people in the group would worship on Sundays with a Book of Common Prayer. This data is incredibly humbling, and profoundly relevant, to the dedicated souls who've been called to administrate on the diocesan level, our bishops.

And given the data on membership decline across the Episcopal Church, building relationships across diocesan boundaries may prove essential for the very survival of the denomination. Jesus' teachings provide a powerful framework for this process: emphasizing inclusion, humility, and otheroriented concern. And it is a blessing to have bishops around us who are showing forth their willingness to follow suit, opening all of us to new possibility, to new relationship. May our Lord bless the rebirth of the Diocese of the Susquehanna!!!

I was baptized into the Roman Catholic Church at Saint Monica's in South Philadelphia in August of 1944; and in May, 2009, I was received into the Episcopal Church at Saint James, here in Lancaster. You may ask, "Does she still hold a place in her heart for the Catholic Church after all these years? Nostalgia and gratitude, support the answer, "yes." "Is she really committed to the Episcopal Church?" Community and gratitude, support the answer, "yes." So, it is from the perspective of 65 years as a Catholic, and only 15 as an Episcopalian that I feel called to share with you my reflections on the recent 154th Diocesan Convention in State College.

I was overwhelmed from the outset with the affability and communality between the clergy and the laity. Sadly, it wasn't until the late 20th century that this sort of collaboration began to be

RESOLUTION #3: PARISH ENGAGEMENT REGARDING CHRISTIAN NATIONALISM

RESOLVED, that the 154th Convention of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania encourages parishes to prayerfully consider becoming educated and consider taking appropriate action regarding the ideology of Christian Nationalism by recognizing the violence, intimidation, racism, and distortion of scripture associated with the ideology. Christian Nationalism embraced by organizations including but not limited to: New Apostolic Reformation, Dominionism, Seven Mountain Mandate, Project 2025, Black Robed Preachers; We encourage parishes to identify the presence of Christian Nationalism in the area served by the parish.; advocate and take appropriate action to counteract Christian Nationalism in their parish community and the area served by their parish; and exploring the historical role of The Episcopal Church in creating what is today Christian Nationalism.

Vestry, October 20, 2024

Our Vestry met on Sunday, October 20, one day after the Convention. The Agenda included reviewing the minutes of the previous meeting, a financial report, the Administrator's updates, and the Rector's report on the Convention.

It was the welcome changes to the original Resolution "003" that sparked a deep and personal conversation among your Vestry that was moving and emotional. It revolved around the tenants of Christian Nationalism especially with regard to race and ethnicity. We lamented the historical role of the Episcopal Church in the institution of Christian Nationalism, but considered it to be very important to maintain in the official statement. Also discussed with concern and empathy were personal reflections regarding divisive issues confronting our country as it becomes ever more diverse as the world grows smaller and international conflicts accelerate the movement



Friends, Liam had his one year posttreatment appointment today and he is still in the clear!! All of his blood markers were good and his appointments will now be every 3 months instead of monthly. We are praising God for bringing us this far!

That being said, it is still Childhood Cancer Awareness month and while I know all of you are aware that it happens, I am sharing some facts that you may not know about childhood cancers. In the graphic I've attached, it mentions that cancer is the

leading cause of death by disease for children. It is in the top 3 leading causes of death in children for any age group. (Guns and car accidents are the other two but that's for a different day.)

Because cancer is such a big cause of death, you might think that it's being researched and funded as much as any other cancer. You're wrong. Less than 8% of the national cancer research budget goes towards childhood cancer research, which is why many children's cancer protocols are the same as the adult protocol. (Breast cancer research outpaces any other type.)

Annual 2024 Jesse Tree **Project Begins Anew**

Our annual and traditional "season of giving" is upon us and this also heralds the start of the Jesse Tree Project. This program is the seasonal focus of our Community Outreach ministry when giving to the foster children of COBYs during the holidays has been a long-time favorite of this parish.



This service is known as the Jesse Tree **Project. What Is a Jesse Tree?**

The Jesse Tree is a unique Advent custom and the tradition traces back as far as the Middle Ages. The earliest Jesse Trees were made of tapestries, carvings, and stained glass. These visual displays allowed uneducated people who could not read or write to learn about the Scriptures from the time of Creation until the birth of Jesus.

The word advent means "arrival." Because Advent is a time to anticipate and prepare for the arrival of Christ at Christmas. The Jesse Tree represents the family tree, or genealogy, of Jesus Christ. It tells the story of God's salvation plan, beginning with creation and continuing through the Old Testament, to the coming of the Messiah.

The name "Jesse Tree" comes from Isaiah 11:1. "Then a shoot will spring from the stem of Jesse, and a branch from his roots will bear fruit." (NASB) The verse refers to King David's father, Jesse, who is in the lineage of Jesus Christ. The "shoot" that grew from the "stem of Jesse," that is, the royal line of David, is Jesus Christ.

Within your own family, you can make and add ornaments to a tree that represent the story of Jesus.

The St. Edward's Jesse Tree

The St. Edward's Jesse Tree provides a peaceful spot under its branch for gifts that will be given to children in foster care to make Christmas a little brighter. Through If you are willing to add your name to the COBYS Family Services we obtain a list of children in foster care, their ages, and

their Christmas wishes. We don't take the place of Santa. Rather, we act as Santa's helpers by adding another gift or two for a child to open on Christmas morning.

How Can You Participate?

FIRST, you have two options: buy gifts for a child or make a monetary donation that will be used to purchase gifts. (Suggested amount to spend or donate: \$50 to \$60 per child)

NEW THIS YEAR - You are to choose



the name of a child by selecting a "mitten" ornament from our tree. The ornament will identify items on the child's wish list. After you select the mitten ornament, you will remove the part

of the mitten labeled as the "Participant" form.

NEXT, you are to complete the form and return it to the drop-box in the Narthex. (The form will allow you to indicate whether you are opting to attach a check for the "elves" of St. Edwards to purchase items on the child's wish list.)

If you are buying gifts for a specific child, you are asked to bring your wrapped gifts to the church and place under our Jesse Tree by the assigned date.

When will this happen?

The mitten ornaments for selection will be hanging on our tree from November 10 to November 24. (If you are unable to pick an actual ornament from the tree, please let me know and I will choose one for you.)

All monetary donations should be made by November 25, if not sooner. Thanks!

Wrapped gifts will be due December 8. We will aim to deliver the gifts to COBYS on December 9.


